"For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, that each one may receive the things done in the body, according to what he has done, whether good or bad" (2 Corinthians 5:10). Viewed in this light, life on earth is a short probation period in which we must prepare for our future and eternal destination.

The human being is born in sin and, therefore, has the natural inclination towards evil. The Holy Spirit, however, wants to empower us to avoid the evil and follow the good. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life. . . . Heaven is so holy that nothing unclean can enter it, for it is written, "But there shall by no means enter it anything that defiles, or causes an abomination or a lie, but only those who are written in the Lamb's Book of Life" (Revelation 21:27). This holy place can only be a habitation for holy people. "Blessed are the pure in heart, For they shall see God" (Matthew 5:8). All those who die in their sins will never enter heaven. Yearning

ithin the heart of every person there is a yearning, a longing for something or someone. Often it is hard to discern the underlying reason for this longing, because we are so busy with the distractions around us and because we don't want to see how empty we are. So many people try to fulfill this yearning by looking toward the material world. They chase their dreams: if only that job promotion would come or that new car could be bought But sadly, they are left empty. They turn to drugs, pornography, alcohol, anything to numb the longing inside of them. Others try fulfilling this longing by seeking after love and are left always wanting more. The American dream is built upon this inner longing, with the pursuit of happiness being a core value of this dream. People pursue happiness, yet so many are left wondering where this true happiness can be found.

This is what the preacher in Ecclesiastes was searching for: some meaning to life, something that would offer fulfillment. He states, "All things are full of labor; man cannot express it. The eye is not satisfied with seeing, nor the ear filled with hearing" (1:8). This preacher, King Solomon, had all that one could desire at that time. He had untold wealth, great wisdom, a kingdom at peace; he could afford every luxury and whim of the heart. Yet he felt this great emptiness inside of him, and on his journey to find satisfaction he sadly allowed his many wives to turn his heart to idols (1 Kings 11:4).

It was Augustine of Hippo who stated this yearning so well when he wrote, "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our heart is restless until it rests in you." So often, we try to still our restless hearts by turning to the creation instead of the Creator. Though this creation is good and wonderfully amazing, it can never still the inner longing of the soul. Blaise Pascal wrote that inside of us there is an infinite abyss that can only be filled with an infinite and immutable object; in other words, by God Himself. These men realized that inside the human heart there is a thirst for something more, and only God is big enough to quell this thirst.

What are you looking forward to?

Ask this question of a child and they will give you an answer that looks just a few days or weeks into the future. Perhaps they are looking forward to spending a day with their friends or having a birthday party. Ask this question of an adult and they tend to have a little further-reaching outlook on life. Maybe they are looking forward to paying off a mortgage or even retirement. But what would happen if you would pose this question to a Christian? Often in our modern, affluent age, the things that the Christian looks forward to are no different than others around them. We have the same goals and aspirations. In many ways, we have acquired heaven here on earth. Our basic needs are taken care of and often we have money left over to enjoy life. What is there to look forward to?



This stands in sharp contrast to how the early Christians viewed life and what they looked forward to. Peter writes that since this world will one day dissolve, we are to live a life that is defined by the word "godliness," our conduct is to be holy, and we are to be looking forward to that day when a new heaven and earth will be created in which righteousness dwells (2 Peter 3:11-14). In other words, we are to be yearning for heaven. It was this yearning for a better world, a city that God was building, that caused Abraham to leave his country and his family and set out on a path of obedience and trust. He was willing to sacrifice everything, because he had a yearning for a better place.

How often do you think about eternity? Do you yearn for heaven? Heaven is a wonderful place that will be beyond our wildest imaginings. When the apostles wrote about heaven, you can sense how they struggled to describe it. Paul writes, "Eye has not seen, nor ear heard, nor have entered into the heart of man the things which God has prepared for those who love Him" (1 Corinthians 2:9). John writes about the City of God in Revelation and describes its radiance like a most rare jewel. Its foundations were adorned with every kind of jewel, its streets were made of pure gold, and God's glory was fully revealed. The material things often treasured in this present age will be walked upon in heaven.

This will be a place of no more evil, no more violence, no more hate; instead, love will reign. There will

be no more death, no more pain, no more sorrow; instead God will wipe away every tear we have cried in this life and we will experience eternal joy. Everything will be made new. Our bodies will no longer ache, we will no longer need surgeries or even dental work. There will no longer be any painful goodbyes, just perfect delight in God's presence.

This is what our future holds as Christians. This is what we are to be looking forward to and it is this yearning for heaven that ought to transform the way we live our lives today. Because heaven is a reality, we are to be storing up treasures in heaven and not on earth (Matthew 6:19-20). Because the glory of the coming age is going to be so great, we can bear the sufferings of our present age as we wait in great expectation for the world to come (Romans 8:18). And as already noted, because we are yearning for the new heaven and earth, we live a life that is pleasing to God.

What we are looking forward to will shape the way we live today. If we are looking forward to retirement, then we will be saving money in a retirement fund; if we are looking forward to paying off our mortgage, then we will put aside extra money each month; but if we are looking forward to heaven, then we will be investing our energies, our talents, and our material goods in such a way that it will bring dividends for eternity. inside each heart there is a void, a deep longing for peace, happiness, and satisfaction. Among these seekers, you will find every age group: the high and low, the rich and poor, the educated and the uneducated. Everyone desires to find happiness. But only a few ever find true satisfaction.

rich man who relied on his wealth and prosperity: "'Fool! This night your soul will be required of you; then whose will those things be which you have provided?' So is he who lays up treasure for himself, and is not rich toward God" (Luke 12:20-21).

Comparable to that are those individuals who seem to not have time for God and godly things. They concern themselves only with fleeting, earthly things. People try to gratify their unsatisfied soul but will not find true peace and contentment if they don't turn to God. God's Word remains truth: "'There is no peace,' Come to Jesus. You will find peace in Him. The person who belongs to Jesus has everything that will provide true satisfaction for time and eternity. The person who doesn't belong to Him has nothing that has value and lasting worth.

In conclusion, the testimony of an educated, prestigious person who came to know the great gift of God in Christ Jesus reveals that "what things were gain to me, these I have counted loss for Christ. Yet indeed I also count all things loss for the excellence of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord, for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and count them as rubbish, that I may gain Christ" (Philippians 3:7-8).

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Need We Fear Death?

Ithough you may fear death and not wish to think about it, death is not the scary monster some people imagine it to be. As certain as the Jordan River flows towards the Dead Sea, so certain it is that we too will pass away. All life approaches death. We cannot change that. You were born not only to live but also to die.

When told that his infant son had died, a father exclaimed, "Poor little child, it died before it had a chance to live." Death has no rivals. You may not wish to think about it, yet death will come for each one of us.

"So what shall we do? How can we face the inevitable?" you may ask. Jonathan Edwards was a preacher of the gospel. Shortly before death, to everyone's surprise, he said, "Trust in God, and ye need not fear." He seemed already to have had a glimpse into the unknown world, and he spoke these last words as a farewell to those he loved.

Charles Hodge once said, "You plant a seed: it does not come up a seed, but a flower." Should the future of our bodily state not be what the flower is to the seed? Compare the beauty of the flower with the humble appearance of the seed. The scent and the loveliness of the flower surpass the efforts of the gardener who planted the seed. In

like manner, life after death will far exceed all our expectations. When we look at the laws of nature, we find that life always emerges after death.

If God, the Almighty Father, allows a seemingly cold, lifeless acorn to burst out of its shell and grow into a magnificent oak tree, would He then neglect the human soul which was created in His image? If God allows a bare, dead-looking rosebush to sprout new life in the spring sunshine following a cold winter, would He not also have words of hope for the human soul when the winter of life arrives?

The inspired words of the apostle Paul are a comfort to those who are dying: "Death, where is your sting? O Hades, where is your victory?' . . . But thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Corinthians 15:55, 57). The Bible tells us that death does not have the final say. Life continues after death, and it continues on a higher plane. The abundant life Jesus came to give us never ends. "He who believes in the Son has everlasting life" (John 3:36a). Someone once said, "My loved ones who have departed this life are only in the upper room, waiting until I come."

The testimony of the early Christians confirms that God's power and grace can keep His own in perfect peace even in the hour of death. Many of the martyrs faced death joyfully and even with singing. When the Roman emperor, Justinian, watched the hungry, wild animals pounce upon the helpless Christians in the Colosseum in Rome, he reportedly said, "These Christians know how to die!" Death itself was not frightening for those who had experienced Jesus Christ as their personal Savior.

No child of God needs to regard death as a frightening, scary monster. We, who have the assurance that our sins are forgiven, should not forget that Jesus said, "Let not your heart be troubled; you believe in God, believe also in Me. In My Father's house are many mansions; if it were not so, I would have told you. I go to prepare a place for you. And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to Myself; that where I am, there you may be also" (John 14:1-3).

A place is prepared in heaven for God's people. When we go to bed at night, we are confident that the next morning will come. In the same way, when we face death, we can know that God has prepared a new morning for us, and we will be awakened to a glorious new life.

I dream of that bright fatherland.


When we inherit those eternal dwellings,

A Pivotal "At Last"

Mark the perfect man, and behold the upright; for there is a happy end to the man of peace. Psalm 37:37 (ASV)

lives. The usual course of life spurs us on, and living conditions change and get altered. The present quickly becomes the past, and only certain memories remain.

I remember my last day of school and how hard it was to leave my teachers and good friends. Likewise, we may remember our last meeting with close friends. We may also think back to the last time we saw our parents and heard their last words. A retiree may remember his last day of work. In this life, we will all experience that final "move" or that last journey.

Very often, we are completely unaware of something being the "last" time. Without expecting it, we may have attended our last worship service on that Sunday. Or someone may have left his home, quite unsuspecting, for the last time. I once saw a quote at the back door of a house: "Do not depart your home in anger; many have left never to return." How often this has come to pass! Many fathers and sons came home on leave from the war and didn't realize that it would be their last time. It was the last reunion and the last goodbye. All these cases teach us how serious the "last" in our lives can be.

The above-cited Bible verse speaks of a very important "last" which will be crucial at the end of our lives. Who of us does not wish our life to end well? It is possible. A certain requirement is needed: "be

blameless and live upright." Being blameless or devout does not just mean to be selfless, good-natured, tolerant, helpful, and good. It also doesn't describe a person who goes to church every Sunday. Being blameless or devout is really a matter of the heart. He who walks before God with a pure heart and in reverence is devout. Being blameless or devout means to have the right relationship with God and honor Him through faith, righteousness, and obedience.

The truly blameless man will please his God and other people. He will abstain from every sin and have a distinct fear of God. Such a man will never forget his God and will also not be forgotten by Him. With this glimpse into its true meaning, we will realize that "the future of that man is peace." And this is what is meant by the "last" which occurs at the end of our lives.

We find this special "last" in other passages of the Bible. In Deuteronomy 32:18 and 20, we read, "Of the Rock who begot you, you are unmindful, and have forgotten the God who fathered you. . . . I will hide My face from them, I will see what their end will be." In Proverbs 16:25, we read, "There is a way that seems right to a man, but its end is the way of death." These verses are thought-provoking since, in many cases, this has actually happened.

Many years ago, a young man visited us on a Sunday. We took him along to church. The sermon affected him so deeply that tears ran down his cheeks. He real-



ized his guilt before God, but did not seize the opportunity to repent. After the service, he said goodbye and we never saw him again. Many years later, we heard that he was living in a squalid basement suite with other desolate and bitter men. He had fallen into bad company and died under unexplained circumstances. How tragic! They turned their backs on God and did not know what would happen to them in the end.

Should we not pause and think about the question in Jeremiah 5:31: "But what will you do in the end?" The people in his time had embraced the false message and allowed themselves to be drawn into error. What could the result be? What is wrong can't lead to correct results. But "mark the blameless man, and observe the upright; for the future of that man is peace." Jesus will say to those, "Come, you blessed of My Father!" (Matthew 25:34). That will be the joyful meeting with

Him in the eternal city of God. Before being stoned, Stephen, a man of faith and filled with the Holy Spirit, saw heaven open and Jesus standing at the right hand of God (see Acts 7:55). His death was painful, but his welcome into heaven was wonderful. Yes, the future of that man is peace! Are we just as certain?

A poet wrote:

It more than her doll and all her other toys. But one day, the neighbors' big dog attacked the poor animal and killed it. Oh, how it hurt little Eva! Sobbing, she ran into the garden and hid. For a long time, she would not be comforted.

A few days later, she found a birdcage by the living room window that housed a beautiful canary from her parents. How happy Eva was! Eventually, she was able to forget about her sweet kitten, as she joyfully listened to the sweet song of the little bird. She fed it carefully and felt very blessed.

But one morning, when she was about to feed the bird again, she saw him lying cold and motionless on the floor of the cage. He was dead. This time, Eva did not cry loudly but instead went about sad and quiet.

When her father saw her sitting huddled in the corner of the big armchair one evening, he felt very sorry for her. "Evie," he said, "should I give you a puppy that will jump around with you everywhere?"—"No, thank you, Daddy," she replied, looking at her father. "How about a bunny? Or a hamster?" her father continued.

Eva suddenly threw her arms around her father's neck and with tears in her eyes, she cried, "Oh Daddy, dear Daddy, can you not give me something that will not die?"

The father held his child close to his chest as she sobbed out the pain she had held back for so long. Finally, he said in a quiet, solemn voice, "My Eva, I can only offer you one thing that never dies and never ends, and that is Jesus. He is life! If you give Him your heart, you can have Him forever and ever!"

God's Promises– Also Relevant for Seniors?

God Himself is timeless—as well as His promises. So they apply to every age group and at any time. But especially when we urgently need them.

uch could be said and written about God's promises. How many sermons have been preached on this theme? We also think of hymns, for example: "Though heaven and earth will pass away, God's promises stand." Another composer goes one step further and writes, "For I've trusted, and tested, and tried it, and I know God's promise is true."

The Bible is the book of promises. Someone found 5467 promises within it. The number of promises is not as important as the fact that these promises, according to 2 Corinthians 1:19-20, are "Yes and Amen" in Jesus Christ. That means that God stands on all His promises.

When we look at these many promises, we realize that not all of them apply to each of us personally. God made promises to specific individuals: Abraham, when He promised him a son, or King Hezekiah, to whom He added 15 years of life when he was deathly ill. The promises were specifically meant for one person at a specific time. Other promises were meant for Israel in a specific situation, like conquering Canaan under Joshua's guidance.

God always kept His word, even if Abraham had to wait a long time for the fulfillment of this promise. God was not dependent on Abraham and Sarah's help. What He has promised, He is able to do and fulfill. It is so revealing when we read at the end of Abraham's life, "Now Abraham was old, well advanced in age; and the Lord had blessed Abraham in all things" (Genesis 24:1), just as He had promised him, "I will bless you" (Genesis 12:2).

In addition to the specific promises, there are also those that apply to all humans. Take the promise of God that Peter mentions in his Pentecost sermon: "And it shall come to pass that whoever calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved" (Acts 2:21). This promise is meant for all.

We are on the seniors' page and are therefore justified in asking: "Are there promises for those who are now on the other side of 50? Are those of us who have already lived out the largest part of our lives still able to lean on God's promises like a secure staff, during our remaining time?" Of course! God, Who said, "Let the children come to me," has not forgotten us seniors. God knows that concerns about aging, can often be accompanied by uncertainty, fears, and questions about the future. Through His promises, God wants to assure us and strengthen our trust in Him, to encourage us, and to help us end our journey with joy.

Each enduring promise depends on its giver, the Almighty God, "Who made heaven and earth" (Psalm 121:2). Let's look at a few of God's promises:

• "Even to your old age, I am He, and even to gray hairs I will carry you! I have made, and I will bear; even I will carry, and will deliver you" (Isaiah 46:4).

If we look in the mirror, it becomes clear He is not speaking to children, but to us, which allows each of us to claim this promise. What a tremendous statement! God said "I will." What God wills, He can fulfill. What does He want? "I will carry you into your old age." Because we may sometimes have doubts, He states one more time, "I have made, and I will bear; even I will carry, and will deliver you." Have you noticed that in just one verse, God emphasizes three times "I will?" I don't know if you interpret this verse as I do, but to me it means that there is nothing I need to fear. My God bears and carries me.

•"Let your conduct be without covetousness; be content with such things as you have. For He Himself has said, 'I will never leave you nor forsake you.' So we may boldly say: 'The Lord is my helper; I will not fear. What can man do to me?'" (Hebrews 13:5-6).

These verses indirectly address problems of existence. Perhaps the question arises when someone looks at their savings account and asks, will this be enough? With a modest pension, we can't take big chances. The writer commands us not to worry but to make do with a joyful heart with whatever we have. We can accomplish this because God has promised not to desert us. This could also be stated: "I will not forsake you."

•"And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and receive you to myself; that where I am, there you may be also" (John 14:3).

Shortly before His ascension, Jesus spoke these words. They are not just encouraging words but also contain a promise. Here on earth, the question of our future may cause fear and worry. How long will we be able to live in our own house? If we can't manage on our own, what then? "Assisted living" are two words we don't want to hear or utter. Where we will live out our last days is not guaranteed. However, Jesus' promise goes beyond this time and illumines our future. Our definite place of residence is in a better world and is specifically where Jesus resides. When things become complicated in our decreasing ability to care for ourselves, it may become necessary to depend on the help of others. I am able to console myself with the thought that soon I will take up residence with Jesus!

• "Then I, John, saw the holy city, New Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a


bride adorned for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from heaven saying, 'Behold, the tabernacle of God is with men, and He will dwell with them, and they shall be His people. God Himself will be with them and be their God. And God will wipe away every tear from their eyes; there shall be no more death, nor sorrow, nor crying. There shall be no more pain, for the former things have passed away'" (Revelation 21:2-4).

It's all about heaven. "Where do I go after I die?" is what people often ask. The answer naturally depends on our standing with Jesus. As followers of Him, we can expect an unimaginable eternity. When we close our eyes as suffering and frail humans, we will be with Jesus in a place where "tears, death, sorrow, noise, and pain" are foreign to us. The sorrows of this time have boundaries—sooner or later they do have an end—and then this applies: "Eye has not seen, nor ear heard, nor have entered into the heart of man the things which God has prepared for those who love Him" (1 Corinthians 2:9).

We have touched on only a small number of God's many promises. One brother read his Bible with pencil in hand so that every time he encountered a promise, he would write "For me" in the margin. This gave him strength and courage to carry on; he was totally "convinced that what He had promised He was also able to perform" (Romans 4:21).

Chiming in with the composer's song, I would like to encourage you to "trust in the promises, Brothers and Sisters"!

"Therefore keep the words of this covenant, and do them, that you may prosper in all that you do. All of you stand today before the LORD your God: your leaders and your tribes and your elders and your officers, all the men of Israel, your little ones and your wives—also the stranger who is in your camp, from the one who cuts your wood to the one who draws your water—that you may enter into covenant with the LORD your God, and into His oath, which the LORD your God makes with you today, that He may establish you today as a people for Himself, and that He may be God to you, just as He has spoken to you, and just as He has sworn to your fathers, to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob." (Deuteronomy 29:9-13)

Moses was nearing the end of his life and God had a job for him yet: He wanted to renew His covenant with Israel. Back when God had given His Ten Commandments to Israel at Mount Sinai, He had entered into a covenant with them, and now the Lord wanted to renew that covenant with the next generation. Of Israel's leaders, only Moses, Joshua, and Caleb had been present at the enacting of the first covenant.

What a privilege it is for man to enter into a covenant with God! When humans make a pact, they always seek a mutual benefit of that alliance, but God doesn't need anything man has to offer. If He makes a covenant with man, then He does it to offer mankind His love and compassion. Such a pact is always to man's advantage. Have you accepted God's offer of a covenant with Him?

How do we enter into a covenant with God?

God must be willing to make a covenant. The inferior party can never force the superior one to make a cov-

enant. At the end of World War II, the Axis powers, as losers, were forced to accept the Allies' conditions of unconditional surrender. They had no choice but to accept whatever the victors demanded. In like manner, man has nothing with which to force God to enter a covenant with him.

But God greatly desires to enter into a covenant with man, a pact in which He wants to gift us with every manner of blessing in Christ. Tirelessly, in His great love and grace, Jesus entreats, "Come to Me, all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls" (Matthew 11:28-29). "And the Spirit and the bride say, 'Come!' And let him who hears say, 'Come!' And let him who thirsts come. Whoever desires, let him take the water of life freely" (Revelation 22:17).

In a covenant with God, His will must always be paramount. Man, guilt-laden and seeking grace, does not determine the conditions of the pact, but rather the thrice-holy God. Man must plead for grace, for forgiveness and renewal, in order to be worthy to enter into a covenant with God. This is only possible by the precious blood of Jesus that was shed for sin. In Psalm 50:5 the Lord says, "Gather My saints together to Me, Those who have made a covenant with Me by sacrifice." This sacrifice refers to Jesus' dying on the cross. Beneath that cross, by accepting atonement by faith, man enters into a covenant with God. Dear Reader, do you know of a time when you forged into this covenant by repentance and confession of your sins? Have you remained true to this covenant, or have you long since broken it?



The Conditions of the Covenant

What defines a covenant with God? God promises to save man from sin and bondage and to give him a new and pure heart. He promises to never remember or resurrect the sins He's forgiven. As a party to His covenant, God adds man to His church, His family. He desires man for Himself, and endeavors to lead him to a further covenant, in which man consecrates his all to God for time and eternity.

In a covenant with God we become children of God receiving a birthright, an inheritance, and entry into the family of God. Because God is holy, He purifies man and makes him holy in order to exist in His covenant with Him. Yet God has so much more for man if he will enter into a covenant with Him. He promises His love and faithfulness, and to care for him. He will fill man with His power, offer His protection, and much more. The crowning glory: eternal life! Man, in a covenant with God, will rejoice in indescribable glory in the presence of almighty God for all eternity!

What does man bring to this covenant? He promises to renounce the world and sin, and to serve God. He promises to obey God, to cherish Him, and to love Him above all else. As part of the covenant, man promises to remain faithful to God, to serve Him with all his heart and soul, to obey His voice, and to follow Him. Dear Reader, have you kept your part of the covenant with God? Indubitably, God has kept all His promises and conditions. Have you too?

Why enter into a covenant with God?

Israel became and we too will become God's own treasure, and the apple of His eye. People who are not in a covenant with God are His enemies. And who wants

to be an enemy of God? There are many great blessings that result from a covenant with God: God's presence in our life, His protection, His help and guidance, peace in our hearts, knowing true joy, having the best of all friends, knowing His love intimately . . . and many others.

What impact does a covenant with God have on my daily life?

My covenant with God requires that I keep my promise to remain faithful to Him, which will compel me to get onto my knees to pray for His strength for every day and every battle.

Being in a covenant with God means determining His will, doing His will, and living a holy life. This bond compels me to relive and renew in my heart that holy encounter at the altar, where Jesus' blood was applied to my sin-stained soul. PRAYER WEEK TOPICS-JANUARY 2020

The Golden Rule

s we look forward to a new year in the Lord, will we be living by the Golden Rule of God's Word: "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you" (Matthew 7:12)? Such a high standard is only attainable by God's grace and by being born into the Kingdom of God. What a difference this would make in homes and communities, where hate, envy, and strife would be replaced by peace, love and care! How can we live out this command of the Lord Jesus in practical terms? In the previous verses (7-10), Jesus encourages us to pray, by asking, seeking, and knocking in faith until our heavenly Father answers us.

Topic 1 - The Golden Rule of Contentment

"Godliness with contentment is great gain." (1 Timothy 6:6)

Who does not wish to have great gain? Yet most are primarily seeking financial gain. But Jesus said that if a man should gain the whole world but lose his own soul, he has surely lost everything of true value (Luke 9:25). Paul explains that godliness is great gain. God will be with those who live a holy life focused on His will.

The other great gain is contentment. Since we are living in prosperous lands with some of the highest standards of living the world has ever seen, shouldn't we be content? The lie of the devil is that we need to compare ourselves to others who appear to have more than we do. This leads to a continual state of discon-

tent and the desire to become rich. Paul warns that some have lost their faith by such greed, and that the love of money is at the root of all kinds of evil (v.7-10). Let us be content with the basics of life, knowing that the only thing we can carry out of this world is our salvation in Christ. Let's look forward to our treasures in heaven.

We pray:

- a. For a heart of contentment and peace for each day of trial we face, knowing that God will strengthen and comfort us in all of life's difficulties (Philippians 4:11-13).
- b. Lord, help us to live daily by your grace.

Topic 2 - The Golden Rule of Persistent Prayer

"He spoke a parable to them, that men always ought to pray and not lose heart." (Luke 18:1)

When have we prayed enough for God to answer our prayers? Think of the man whom Jesus healed at the pool of Bethesda. He lay ill for 38 years until Jesus came (John 5:1-9).

In Luke 18:1-8 we are encouraged to pray persistently until God answers in His time and in His way. Even the unjust judge gave in to the widow's continual requests, so how much more will God honor the needs of His children!

From my mother I learned this truth: Never give up praying for the lost son, daughter, or relative. She and others prayed for me and other prodigals. Some eight years would pass until I turned back to the Lord and was born again by the Spirit. In the case of my father, she prayed for some 40 years until in his last weeks he too found the Lord. She simply would not give up and insisted we all keep praying for my dad despite his hardened heart.

Let us pray persistently:

- a. As long as someone lives, never give up hope for their lost soul. God can speak to any soul at any time by His Word and Spirit. Perhaps someone will share the Good News with them, and their eyes of faith will be opened.
- b. Your prayers for healing may suddenly be answered and you will praise God for His healing power of both body and soul.



Topic 3 - The Golden Rule of Praying for Others

"I exhort first of all that supplications, prayers, intercessions and giving of thanks be made for all men." (1 Timothy 2:1)

It is natural for us to focus our prayers on those close to our hearts, but God wishes us to expand our horizons and consider that Jesus died for everyone who comes into this world. He so loved the world that He "desires all men to be saved and come to the knowledge of the truth" (v. 4). This includes all your family members, co-workers, and friends. As you pray for their souls, ask God to open doors for you to witness to them. Perhaps giving them a gospel of John as a gift will cause them to consider the saving faith of Jesus. At the same time, pray He opens their spiritual eyes to their lost condition.

In a broader perspective, we are to give thanks for all men and all who are in authority (v.1f). When we consider some of our leaders today, we may find this very difficult to do. Yet Jesus requires us to love and pray for even our enemies (Matthew 5:43-45). God promises this will help to bring about a special blessing, "that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and reverence."

We pray:

a. Lord, help me to witness to someone today. Prepare their heart and give me wisdom to speak your truth into their life.

b. Lord, help me to love and pray for all people, even those who persecute us. Help me to recognize that "this is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior" (v.3).

Topic 4 - The Golden Rule of a Life of Thanksgiving

"Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, in everything give thanks; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18)

All of us are familiar with difficult days filled with suffering, heartache, and grief. We know bad things will happen to good people, because we live in a fallen world. We think of the sufferings of Job, the seemingly endless enemies and battles King David faced, John the Baptist imprisoned and the apostle James, who were both executed for their faith. The list goes on. How can there be joy amidst such suffering?

Today there are many cases that bring tears to our eyes: children suffering from incurable diseases, the homeless and the abused, along with accidents and sickness that leave some barely able to function. And yet, we are always to keep our joy in the Lord by praying without ceasing. Therein lies our secret: we will keep praying, thanking, and worshipping the Lord, regardless what comes our way.

We pray:

a. That even in our difficulties, we will give thanks for our great salvation through the blood of Jesus. We will realize that He has borne our griefs and will strengthen us to face every trial.

b. That the joy of our Lord will always be our strength.

Topic 5 - The Golden Rule of Praying for the Church

"We give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you in our prayers." (1 Thessalonians 1:2)

Paul is writing to the local church in Thessalonica and wishing them grace and peace from God (v.1). He gives thanks for each of the church members and lets them know they are not forgotten in his prayers. Why is this so important even today?

On the one hand, the devil wishes to divide Christians, promote false doctrines, tempt, and mislead us. Paul warns the church elders of Ephesus to take heed of this in Acts 20:28-30. By watching prayerfully and asking God, through His Holy Spirit, to guide and strengthen us, we can overcome the evil one and stand together for the truth.

On the other hand, Paul's prayers are directed at encouraging Christians to grow in their work of faith, labor of love, and patience in hope (v.3-5). This is only possible by living true to the Word and in the power of the Holy Spirit. It is the same Spirit Who will answer our prayers. There are times when it is difficult to pray: times of persecution, loss, sickness, and all kinds of affliction. How wonderful to know then, that other Christians are praying for you!

We pray:

a. Lord, help us to pray for all of our fellow Christians, locally and in other places.

b. Help our brothers and sisters around the world, that their faith might grow and persevere in the love of Christ, despite persecution, poverty, temptation, and any other affliction.

Experiences with God

"Bless the Lord, O my soul; and all that is within me, bless His holy name!" (Psalm 103:1)

Lord has done great things for me again. I had internal bleeding, and in order to determine the cause, I was supposed to have a colonoscopy. We thanked the dear Lord with all our hearts. He has done a great miracle for me again. He is still the same, great God. On Wednesday in prayer meeting, I testified that God healed me. I thank all the brothers and sisters who prayed for me. May God reward them.

It is Later Than You Think!

The expression, "being late," is used in conjunction with an event. Unfortunately, many "push" the occasion of their life's end into a distant future. They do not know that the time is already near.

"It is later than you think!"—This phrase is written on a garden wall in the Chinese capital Beijing. Of course, this does not mean your wrist watch: you would quickly get it adjusted if it started losing time. But your life's clock is later than you think!

Do you need evidence for this? Just read the news. The articles about accidents and crimes and the pages of obituaries tell you everything. Add to this endless litany of individual cases all sorts of catastrophes, in which hundreds of people must leave this world from one moment to the next.

It happened on October 8, 1952. The station clock in the London suburb of Harrow indicated it was 8:19. On the platform was a commuter train, fully occupied with mostly laborers and school children. At that moment, the Perth–Euston express, running late, hurtled down the track at full speed and smashed into the commuter train, bringing down part of a footbridge and throwing debris over the other tracks. In the next moment, the morning Euston–Manchester express came racing in and crashed into the wreckage, ploughing into the footbridge. The cars piled up in a jumble of steel, wood, glass, and people, to a depth of 10 meters. Hundreds of passengers lay under the rubble of the tangled debris. The screaming of the wounded and the moaning of the dying was horrifying.

Everything happened within a span of 40 seconds. But what about the station clock? It still showed 8:19. It

had to be later. Yes, it certainly was later. The vibrations from the impact or a flying piece of wood had stopped it. But there was something else hanging on the wall next to the clock: a poster from the station mission. People stopped, and, deeply shocked, read, "Prepare to meet your Lord."

The morning mist still hung in the air as wreckers with cranes rolled up to rescue the victims. The disaster claimed 112 lives and injured 340. It was later than they all thought!

The Psalmist is so right when he says in Psalm 103:15-16, "As for man, his days are like grass; as a flower of the field, so he flourishes. For the wind passes over it, and it is gone, and its place remembers it no more."

In the face of the catastrophe in Harrow, I am unequivocally aware of the fact that my life is not in my hands but in God's hands alone. Because I have no insight into His hidden workings, I want to remind myself, it may be later than I think. Whether spring, summer, autumn, or winter, whether day or night, death is constantly passing through our ranks, and nobody knows where it will find its prey. A poet says: "In the midst of life, we are in death."

We are actually candidates for death from the moment of our birth. None of us knows at what moment our thread of life will tear. When you get up in the morning and start the new day abounding with health, remember, it may be later than you think.
