



"Once when my husband came home from his trip, he told me how he had had an interesting encounter. As he traveled by train, an older lady started a conversation with him. She gave him a detailed account of Jesus Christ and explained that her reason for travel-

ing was to spread the good news about Him. My husband was very impressed, although he never became a Christian himself. Deeply touched by this story. I asked myself, 'What can be so interesting about this Jesus that this elderly woman feels so compelled to devote her time traveling throughout China?' That is why I obtained a Bible and soon afterwards found salvation in Jesus!"

face of Christ, smiles on them. How warm and invigorating is the bright glow of the sun of grace! We drink life from it, divine life.



There are some principles, however, that we cannot afford to overlook. We find them in the Bible, an inexhaustible source of spiritual knowledge. As we study the Scriptures, we want to pay special attention to what should be included in the daily schedule of a Christian.

Daily Prayer

"Be merciful to me, O Lord, for I cry to You all day long" (Psalm 86:3).

Blessed is he who takes time to cease, To look up toward the heavenly place, Upward to God, the Father, who sees, His window is open to hear his case. Blessed is he who kneels down for prayers, Sending his sighs home to heaven above, In morning and evening his soul he bares, He gazes toward Zion with hope and love.

Daily prayer. Would you consider it a heavy burden? Do we need to push ourselves to pray? David says, "I cry out to You daily, merciful God!" Many have followed the example of this prayer warrior and testify,


"I also pray every day." Daily prayer is an indication of living faith. Perhaps you think praying that often is not necessary or even overrated. Jesus always deemed it as necessary to pray and not to become careless or unconcerned. He Himself always took time to pray. Could a child bear not to speak with his father for days, weeks, or perhaps months and years? It is not a difficult burden but rather a wonderful privilege to be able to speak to our heavenly Father every day. Wouldn't you like to begin today to draw near to God in prayer on a daily basis? He who speaks with God is never alone.

Daily Bible Reading

"These were more fair-minded than those in Thessalonica, in that they received the Word with all readiness, and searched the Scriptures daily to find out whether these things were so" (Acts 17:11).

Help me, Lord, that I might study Your sweet Word and understand. Teach me things that I don't yet see, That my heart may know Your plan, That with joy I may receive it And obey Your will for me. Work in me, yes, I believe it, For the truth does set me free.

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Reading the news every day, listening to it, or watching it is a daily habit for many who consider it important, a part of life. But to read the Bible? Is that so important? Isn't it enough to attend weekly worship services and Bible studies to hear something from God's Word?

No, that is not enough. God speaks to us through His Word. He desires to give us direction and guidance for every day. Therefore, reach for your Bible every day and read it. Do you read your Bible? Or have you become tired and given up? Around you are people who have grown to love God's Word and would never want to be without it. The Word of God has become the bread from which they thrive, the rock on which they stand, the spring beside which they rest. Reading the Bible strengthens your trust in God, gives comfort in adversity, gives power to the weak, encouragement when afraid, and heals broken hearts. The Holy Scriptures are like an enormous land where riches and treasures can only be found through daily digging and searching. "You search the Scriptures, for in them you think you have eternal life; and these are they which testify of Me" (John 5:39).

Daily Praise

"Blessed be the Lord, who daily loads us with benefits" (Psalm 68:19).

Should we praise God every day, or is that asking too much? Life brings so many disappointments; the daily grind is so difficult; the future looks so gray. How are we supposed to praise God? Is there anyone who can achieve this?

You may be surprised. Many have done this; they have praised God even in difficulties. Just open your

Bible and read. You will find people who praised God in all sorts of situations. It may have been in tremendous anxiety, through valleys of adversity, in the fiery furnace, or even in a den of lions. Even while in prison awaiting their sentence or overloaded with tiring work, not knowing which end was up, they glorified and praised God. It was in these turbulent times that God was the closest to them. When Job was hit so hard with adversity, he fell down before God and prayed, "The Lord gave, and the Lord has taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord" (Job 1:21). When Paul and Silas were shackled and sitting in jail, they did not despair. Instead, at midnight, they started praying and praising God, not allowing their afflictions to silence them. David, the writer of many Psalms, encourages us: "Let us exalt His name together" (Psalm 34:4). If you are awaiting with joy the great hallelujah that will be sung before the throne of God, then you will sing and praise God daily, even in times of affliction and fear.

Daily Willingness to Suffer

"If anyone desires to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow Me" (Luke 9:23).

Take up your cross and follow Christ, Nor think till death to lay it down; Stand by in times of goodness and joy, While suffering do not look around; For only those who bear the cross May hope to wear a golden crown.

When Christ called the ferocious persecutor of His church, Saul from Tarsus, He showed him what his



prospect would be: "For I will show him how many things he must suffer for My name's sake" (Acts 9:16). Suffering is not something exceptional in following Christ. It is just part of it.

Being a follower of Christ requires a complete surrender to the Lord, Who gave Himself as a sacrifice for us and our sins. If you want to follow Jesus, you must say "no" to your personal desires. Let us serve Jesus, even if it entails suffering. Jesus Christ leads the way for us. He helps us in all adversities. Therefore, let us be prepared to suffer and work with joy for Christ. He is our Lord. If you follow Jesus, He will bring you to the goal. Even if it costs us tears and hardship, our reward will be indescribable joy and happiness.

Daily Faithfulness

"Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life" (Revelation 2:10).

If you are a child of God, you should strive to keep this relationship forever. A life of following Christ is insignificant without faithfulness. If you have said "yes" to the Lord, you cannot take "some time off" for a few days to live without Him or even be against Him. God is true to His Word, and His promises are trustworthy. The love of Jesus surrounds us day and night. He thinks of us and blesses us. How can we possibly react to such faithfulness with unfaithfulness? God only looks for a faithful steward. His desire is to some day tell His servants and maidservants, "Well done, good and faithful servant; you were faithful over a few things, I will make you ruler over many things" (Matthew 25:21).

Daily Testifying

"Proclaim the good news of His salvation from day to day" (1 Chronicles 16:23).

Awake! O Spirit, among Christians all, Who faithfully watch upon the stone wall; Day and night witnessing, Jesus to tell, Fight against Satan his kingdom to quell. Their messages peal throughout the whole earth To bring all the nations to God through rebirth.

Before Jesus ascended to Heaven, He spoke these words to His disciples: "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15). God expects His disciples to tell others about His love and grace shown to all people. Even men in the Old Testament were aware of this mandate, causing King David to appoint Asaph and his brothers to sing songs of praise.

How much more should we, who have received forgiveness of sins through the blood of Jesus, share the message of salvation with those around us. Repeatedly, God's enemies tried to stop the Christians from witnessing. But His messengers could not stop; they obeyed God more than men. Even if over time many Christians were persecuted, the message of Jesus Christ has never been destroyed. Is God's business burning in our souls? Have we told others that Jesus is the salvation of the world? Are our words and our actions a constant, clear testimony for Christ? Do we express our thanks for Christ's sacrifice on the cross? The world needs to hear of Jesus. Let us not neglect to share this message.

The Christian Race

"Do you not know that those who run in a race all run, but one receives the prize? Run in such a way that you may obtain it." (1 Corinthians 9:24)

In his letters, the apostle Paul frequently compares the Christian life to a race. At the time, the Isthmian Games were regularly held near Corinth, meaning that Paul's audience would have had the reference points to understand the spiritual lessons he was drawing.

These races revolved around three essential elements: the runner, the race, and the victor's reward. Not everyone was able to participate in those earthly races, but all are invited to the Christian race. God does not show favoritism. Regardless of wealth or social status, everyone has the same privileges and opportunities in Christ.

In the ancient Greek races, participants had to fulfill certain conditions, register their names, and commit to following the prescribed rules. If they failed to do so, all their efforts were in vain.

The same holds true for spiritual races. The first rule is "Unless one is born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God" (John 3:3). Another rule reads, "If anyone competes in athletics, he is not crowned unless he competes according to the rules" (2 Timothy 2:5). The conditions for entering the Christian race include leaving everything behind, taking our cross upon us, and following our Savior.

Anyone who wanted to succeed in the race mentioned by Paul had to prepare. The Christian race also requires preparation. The runners back then had to cast off anything that slowed them down, which applies to the spiritual race today. "Let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us" (Hebrews 12:1).

An earthly runner needs to be strong and healthy. This involves making healthy nutritional choices and avoiding food or drinks that harm the body. "But take heed to yourselves, lest your hearts be weighed down with carousing, drunkenness, and cares of this life, and that Day come on you unexpectedly" (Luke 21:34).

This is also true of the spiritual race. We need a strong and healthy soul. In order to overcome, we must be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might. To become strong, we need to choose our nutrition

carefully—we need good spiritual food. For example, we are sometimes strengthened in the Christian race through fasting or praying.

In contrast to the ancient Greek races, the spiritual race can be won by all participants at once. However, each person still needs to personally cross the finish line. Many are more interested in other people's races than their own. Have you ever seen someone taking part in a race turn around to criticize another participant? No! There is simply no time for that; the only focus is the goal, and every effort goes into running the race

The Christian race is not undertaken just for fun. It is about achieving something, about reaching the goal we have in our sights. Paul writes, "One thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind and reaching forward to those things which are ahead, I press toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 3:13–14). Let us always remember, Satan is trying to stop us and prevent us from earning the crown. We cannot just sit back and relax. Instead, we need to keep going, equipped with God's power and grace at all times.

It is important not to miss the goal but to emerge from the contest victorious. In the end, the outcome of a race here on earth does not really matter. But losing the spiritual race means losing eternal bliss and entering into eternal pain and suffering. It means unending night and darkness in the presence of Satan and his angels.

Let us therefore run the race and endure until the end. When we are tried and tempted or when we grow tired, let us look to the Lord and claim the promise, "But those who wait on the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint" (Isaiah 40:31). Through God's grace, everyone who wants to can endure and overcome to win the crown.

The victors of the ancient Greek races were awarded a wreath that soon dried and withered, but our prize is an everlasting crown. "Be faithful until death, and I will give you the crown of life" (Revelation 2:10).

"Tom, when was it you said you felt that hand on your shoulder?"



The Path of the Righteous

"Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the ungodly . . . but his delight is in the law of the LORD For the Lord knows the way of the righteous" (Psalm1:1,2,6).

It is not about any norm of morality or religion but about the righteousness that comes from God's will. It is God Who shows us the way to righteousness. He is righteous who willingly follows and remains on this path with a firm heart. The author of Psalm 119:30 testifies, "I have chosen the way of truth; Your judgments I have laid before me." This means I have made Your righteousness the guiding principle of my life. And that's exactly what God expects from us. The way of the righteous is not about doing what we want. It isn't always an easy path, but it is a path of child-like innocence and leads to great gains. That's exactly why God created this path for us.

We know many of the laws of our country, such as regulatory laws, tax laws, or traffic laws, etc. We have to submit to these laws, no matter which country we live in. Anyone who observes and fulfills the law will be seen as lawful, because they obey it. Experience tells us, however, that injustices can often be contained in human laws. Sometimes the demands of a law contradict God's Word and deliberately complicate the life of believers. How many times has this led to bitter hardships, persecution, and suffering for innocent people!

These facts clearly show that the path of the righteous is not always easy. We also see this very clearly in the life of our beloved Lord Jesus. Even in Old-Testament prophecy, He was seen as "just" and as "a helper." No sin, no injustice, no deceit was found in Him (see 1 Peter 2:22 and Isaiah 53:9). Even Pilate cried out during His interrogation, "I find no fault in Him" (John 18:38). However, He was rejected by His own people.

His hometown of Nazareth also rejected Him. The officials wanted to take His life, and finally He was mercilessly nailed to the cross. A poet wrote, "He carried His cross, the Holiest of all." The Righteous One suffered for the unjust because He wanted to create a way of righteousness for everyone. In spite of being horribly misjudged and ridiculed, He firmly and decidedly remained on the path of righteousness, which eventually led to His victory and gain.

Jesus' disciples were very familiar with the way of righteousness. He had told them of suffering but also of the high gains and advantages of this way. The way of righteousness is profitable for all who walk it. This truth is confirmed by the Bible:

King Solomon spoke of a crown of honor that can be found on the path of righteousness. He states, "But



the path of the just is like the shining sun, that shines ever brighter unto the perfect day" (Proverbs 4:18). "The voice of rejoicing and salvation is in the tents of the righteous" (Psalm 118:15). "Light is sown for the righteous, and gladness for the upright in heart" (Psalm 97:11).

"Righteousness exalts a nation" (Proverbs 14:34), and it exalts us. Through righteousness, we gain the well-being of an innocent, clear, and unencumbered conscience. The truly righteous suffer no inner accusations or frightening thoughts. They are allowed to live in peaceful circumstances and quiet repose. Isn't that a huge blessing and an amazing gain in a person's life? Proverbs 14:32 tells us, "But the righteous has a refuge in his death." Wouldn't we all wish to end our lives with this assurance? This is the blessing of righteousness.

In 2 Corinthians 5:21, Paul speaks of the very important "righteousness that is valid before God."

Choosing our own righteousness is not enough. Therefore, we must ask, "How do we obtain righteousness that is pleasing to God?" Paul explains, "For He made Him who knew no sin to be sin for us, that we might become the righteousness of God in Him" (2 Corinthians 5:21).

No one but Jesus could fulfill the righteousness before God. Through His death, He acquired salvation for us and made us righteous. Paul writes in Romans 8:33-34, "Who shall bring a charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is he who condemns? It is Christ who died [for this purpose]" and "Therefore, having been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Romans 5:1).

3. Sinai—Mountain of the Commandments of God

he Israelites have now traveled three months since they left Egypt. The hard times of slavery belong to the past.

For many years, they worked in inhumane circumstances for Pharaoh. He controlled them, imposed hard labor on them, and punished them through the graceless hand of his overseers. As property of a power-obsessed regime, they were scraping by to stay alive.

"Then the children of Israel groaned because of the bondage, and they cried out; and their cry came up to God because of the bondage. So God heard their groaning" (Exodus 2:23b-24).

God led them out of Egypt through mighty wonders. They reached the Sinai desert and encamped across from Mount Sinai. As the leader of this great nation, Moses needed clear directions and guidance on the next steps to lead them to the Promised Land. The people were asking a lot of Moses. In return, the people were to follow God's commandments and listen to His voice.

Who is not familiar with the burden of excruciating memories of things done in the past, knowing how wrong they were? You were not able to do good in your own strength, but were like a puppet in the hands of Satan, whose only goal is to control people and to enslave them with sin for their entire lives.

But then you experienced the unbelievable wonder of God's rescue in your life: God's pledge to make you His own. You can belong to the kingly priesthood, with the purpose to tell others about the positive changes you have experienced and what quality of life you now have through your relationship with God (Exodus 19:6; 1 Peter 2:9-10). Don't you think you too could inspire others for God?

We can belong to God when we follow His Word. With the coming of Christ to this earth, the way of the law on Mount Sinai had fulfilled its purpose (Romans 10:4). Everyone who believes in Christ is declared righteous. What incredible grace!

Your life not only consists of surprises but also of challenges and stressful situations. You need the commandments of God in your life to safely reach the goal of your journey. Look for God's commandments like silver, and search for them like treasures (Proverbs 2:1-12). Make an effort and climb Mount Sinai in a figurative sense to experience God and to listen to His Word.

No power in this world will then be able to take you from His hand because you belong to Him.

What if the answer is "wait"?

or someone? In our society, everything has to go as quickly as possible. The current ways of communication allow us to receive answers within seconds. Even the things we order can be delivered within days. Compared to how things used to be, waiting has become scarce. When waiting is necessary, for example at a train station when the train is running late or is canceled, I have seldom seen patient and contented people.

What if the answer to our prayers is "wait"? So often, especially in this day and age, we wish for instant answers to our prayers. Yet, in some situations, God does not immediately send us an answer to our prayers, but makes us wait for an answer. Especially in our younger years, there are many decisions to be made, like choosing a career, a marriage partner. a place to live, including location and type of housing, and much more. In many instances, the answer is "wait." During times like these, one song has become very meaningful to me.

"Lord, my soul abides, hopes patiently,
Trusts in You completely, You help willingly.
Be not dismayed, brightly dawns the day,
After winter's coldness spring will come to stay.
In ev'ry trial, in darkest night,
Lord, protect and shield me, my Lord, my Light."

"To abide" means more than "to wait." In the Bible lexicon, we find this definition:

"Abiding means to keep patient watch for the help of God that comes in the end." In Psalm 43:5, we read, "Why are you cast down, o my soul? And why are you disquieted within me? Hope in God; for I shall yet praise Him, the help of my countenance and my God." In a different translation, the word "hope" is replaced with "I trust you, Lord." This verse has often been a comfort to me in times of waiting. Here, giving thanks at the end is not questioned. It is a fact the psalmist constantly reminds himself of. The psalmist was certain God's help would come in the end. As Christians, we can trustingly wait, knowing God will help us.

The enemy wants to attack us, especially in times of waiting. He wants to use the time of waiting to weaken our faith and shorten the time of waiting by encouraging us to move in our own strength and disregard God's will. The Bible warns us about this in the story of King Saul in 1 Samuel 13. God would have confirmed his kingdom forever if he would have waited for God's answer. But as he waited for Samuel, he became impatient and went against God's commands.

Therefore, it is very important to turn to God in prayer and to ask Him for the necessary patience and strength in times of waiting. The Bible can also encourage us in times of waiting. In seasons like this, I would look up verses related to the topic of "abiding" and study those passages. During those times, the phrase "and I will thank Him" has stuck with me. What an immense blessing we can receive, not only if we thank God after our time of waiting, but also giving thanks during the season of waiting, knowing that He has a way for us and that it is the best way, even though we may not always understand it in the moment.

When I look back on those times of waiting, I can only thank God. Those times can bring us closer to God and can strengthen our relationship and trust in God. If you are in a time of waiting right now, I would like to encourage you to "wait upon the Lord."

Testimony

was born into an amazing Christian family. I had the best parents I could ever ask for. I grew up going to church, going to Sunday school, and being told stories about Jesus. I never doubted anything as a child. I remember giving my heart to Jesus a few times, but it never felt sincere and therefore it never lasted long.

Fast forward a few years to the beginning of middle school; grade 7 was a really rough year for me. I didn't have many friends; I wasn't very popular or liked by my peers. I was very shy, quiet, and I always felt lonely. Grade 8 is where things started to change for me. I was 14, and I had finally made a friend. She sat next to me in science class. We started growing closer, hanging out outside of class, and eventually I got to know the rest of her friends' group.

I soon developed a huge crush on a boy in that group. We started spending lots of time together and soon, much to my excitement, he asked me out. I remember one day we had skipped class and were wandering the park. We started talking about religion. Kind of out of nowhere, he informed me that he was a Satanist.

This had taken me back a bit. But because I liked him so much, I kind of just shrugged it off, and told him I didn't believe in anything. It did stay on my mind though. I thought about it for the rest of the day and once I got home, I decided to do a bit of research. I found many pages, websites, and articles about satanism. Eventually, my searches went from, "What is satanism?" to, "How do I become a Satanist?" I found a web page that contained a pretty long

verse. On top it basically said that becoming a Satanist is easy, all you have to do is light a candle, recite these verses, and allow Satan into your heart. Without much consideration, I did exactly that and asked him into my heart.

It wasn't a very noticeable change at first, in fact I never admitted to myself that anything had changed at all. But deep down I knew exactly what I had done. I cleared my search history immediately and closed my laptop. I remember my mom coming into my room soon after and glancing at my laptop. She asked what I was doing, and I just said nothing. I could see it in her eyes that she knew.

Looking back, I see that that's where everything started going downhill. The months went by and It's almost as if every day Satan handed me another brick to carry. Depression, anxiety, fear, restlessness, sadness . . . just little by little so I'd never notice how much weight was being added. I started to change. I had no issues with lying, stealing, or cheating. I never felt guilty. It was like I didn't have a conscience anymore. I did nothing but lie. I started hating everything around me, especially God and anything to do with religion. I never knew what was happening to me though, not really. Every time that one day would pop into my head, I'd just shrug it off. "Nothing happened that day." I'd tell myself. "This is just who I've always been. I'm happy. I'm in control, I'm my own person, no one can tell me what to do." The years went on, I grew more and more miserable, more depressed than I ever had been. I woke up every morning wanting to end my own life. I was so tired, so sad. But still I refused to even believe that I wanted to change. I promised myself I would never become a Christian and secretly loathed everyone who I knew was praying for me. The void in my life kept growing bigger and bigger. I moved out on my own so I could do whatever I wanted without what I thought was a "judgmental" eye from my parents. I threw everything I could into my ever-growing void to try to fill it up; drugs, alcohol, sex, cigarettes, money, tattoos, piercings, anything I could think of that would keep me feeling good. I never felt good.

Things just got worse, and worse and worse. The burden on my back kept getting heavier. Words can't describe how hopeless and stuck I felt.

Looking back, I have no idea how I was even able to walk anymore, especially during these last few months.

[A] Saturday is when everything changed for me. It was a night like any other. I had smoked [marijuana] before bed just like every night because it was the only thing that could make me sleep anymore. I closed my eyes and almost dozed off.

Now, you know when you're half sleeping, and sometimes you feel like you're falling so you kind of jump and wake yourself up? That's exactly what I felt, except when I opened my eyes it didn't stop at all. I couldn't stop falling, I was sweaty, hot, panicked. I knew exactly what was happening. That's when pure fear took over. Never in my life have I ever felt fear as terrifying and intense as that before. I was completely hysterical at this point, "This can't happen." All I could

do was reach for my phone, desperate to call my mom. I was so scared she wouldn't pick up the phone and I'd keep falling. But she did. All I could say was, "Mom, I'm going to hell, I'm going to hell, I'm going to hell. Please come, I'm going to hell." I knew that I was given one last chance. I didn't stop crying until she and my dad came.

As they both prayed, I felt something leave my body, I immediately felt lighter. Then I prayed and asked Jesus to forgive my sins. I physically felt all of my heavy burden just roll off my shoulders; I've never felt anything like that before. I spent the rest of the night at my parents' house. My mom and I talked almost all night and I must have told her I loved her about 50 times (it felt like I hadn't talked to her in years).

I know for sure my life will never go back to the way it was during those 5 years. The way I felt no love, only hate, was completely exhausting.

It's been about a week since that amazing night and I feel lighter than ever before. I can finally start fresh as a brand-new person. I've gotten rid of everything that defined who I was, anything that would tie me to my old life (clothes, music, friends, even my pet snake).

I'm so, so grateful for everyone who prayed for me and never gave up; please continue to pray for me. I'm so excited to start my brand-new life and see what God has in store for me. I know for sure He has everything under control.

Alone

How can we help widows and widowers?

I irst, I would like to direct your thoughts to God's Word:

"Learn to do good; seek justice, rebuke the oppressor; defend the fatherless, plead for the widow" (Isaiah 1:17).

"The Lord watches over the foreigner and sustains the fatherless and the widow" (Psalm 146:9, NIV).

"Pure and undefiled religion before God and the Father is this: to visit orphans and widows in their trouble, and to keep oneself unspotted from the world" (James 1:27).

Here we already find important guidelines from the Bible. In addition, we would like to share an excerpt from an article written by Dr. Irene Loewen. She drew her conclusions after not only seriously considering the plight of widows and widowers but after she visited and interviewed many.

"Being widowed is much worse than I ever thought."

"There are no words to describe how sad and helpless I felt." "I desperately sought help from others and spiritual support. I felt like a leaf blown about by the wind, without finding hope."

These statements describe some of the feelings of widowed people in our churches. At times, they feel neglected. On the other hand, we would like to help but often don't know how to approach someone who is widowed.

But we can learn! If you don't yet have a friend who has experienced the loss of a spouse, you will someday.

Be There for the Widowed Friend

The widowed are vulnerable. They have the great need to talk with someone, but if they share too deeply, they are afraid they may scare away the friends they so desperately need. Therefore, many try to hide their pain. "When we suffer, we sometimes act in illogical ways,"

said a widow. "Attribute this to our pain and don't think we are declaring a wish to be left alone."

Speak with Them about their Questions of Faith

"As a Christian, I felt I had to give the impression that I had everything under control, or my faith would be questioned, especially when someone told me that a true Christian would be happy knowing their spouse was in heaven and there would be no need to grieve the loss." Many who have been widowed acknowledge that God was especially faithful during the loss of their spouse. The belief in a life after death helps a Christian to process the loss. But despite a strong faith, people who are widowed have doubts at times, even questions with respect to a reunion in eternity. This is an important time to consider questions about life, death, and faith. The church is vital in the process of working through these questions! We can study God's Word with them, pray together, and remind them that God wants to hear the cries of their hearts.

Don't Forget: Healing Is a Slow Process!

Many widows and widowers sometimes hear comments like these: "Your sorrow is rather excessive!" or "You should be over that by now!" or "Forget the past and look to the future!" Those responses don't help. God never said we won't experience pain in this life or that He expects us to enjoy mourning. But God promised He would faithfully carry us through.

In the time right after the funeral, others reach out to help the widowed spouse. Six weeks later, they often feel forgotten. Most say this is hardly enough time to really believe their beloved partner will never return. In most cases, it takes about two years to really begin to feel like a whole person again.

Expect Normal Reactions

Someone who is newly widowed will be shocked, confused, in turmoil, and absentminded. Health, nutrition, and sleep sometimes take a turn for the worse. Some get scared at times that they hear footsteps or a key in the door and think their partner to be there. But no one comes! They need our help to navigate the normal stages of grieving. "As painful as it may be, grieve now! The only thing worse than dealing with a new situation is doing nothing. We are allowed to grieve."

Share the Grief

"The more that others were sorry about my loss, the greater was my strength to accept it. It was almost as if others were carrying some of my grief." People often avoid sharing someone's sorrow out of fear they will make the situation more difficult. We are more likely to be helpful when we admit we also can't understand why just this person had to die, instead of trying to make it all better.

Avoid Thoughtless Comments

If we don't know what to say, we sometimes stumble terribly in our effort to extend sympathy. The widowed often prefer we would say nothing and just cry with them or simply admit we don't know what to say. It's better than hearing, "At least you still have your mother." (She would rather have her husband.)

Focus on Memories

"Most people who have lost a spouse want to talk about them. We want to hear something about them from others who knew them, but sadly, many don't talk about the deceased at risk of causing pain. We actually wish for the exact opposite." A widower added: "No one wants to talk about my late wife. After 30 years of marriage, I find this almost unbelievable!" It is certainly understood: If the deceased has ever touched your life, then share this with the grieving spouse—and not only during the first few weeks.

Keep up the Contact

Widows and widowers often feel excluded from previous friendships with other couples. Comments such as these: "We thought about you yesterday evening when we went out for dinner. If your husband were still alive, we would have called you." The affected woman felt like screaming: "But I'm still alive!"

Groups that get together often use the widowed person as the babysitter instead of inviting them to go along. Often the widow or widower is just invited if the other person's spouse isn't going or only if it's a group of widows. The widowed spouses assured us: "We will not steal your husband or your wife—we only want to speak with them and hear their opinion." Those bereaved who were included in their circle of friends considered this one of the most important factors in their healing.

Seize Special Opportunities

Every season brings special memories the grieving person has to deal with and find healing. Cards, flowers, and words that show you remember their loss and are there for them will be so appreciated.

Offer Practical Help

Those who are widowed are confronted with all the responsibilities they once shared with their partner. They need to deal with car repairs, cooking, financial issues, shopping, household tasks, child rearing, and decisions regarding hundreds of questions. Because they don't want to impose on anyone, it is more helpful to offer: "I would be happy to check your vehicle on Saturday morning" rather than saying: "Call me if you need help."

Encourage the bereaved to make no major decisions for the next while—at least to avoid any decisions that can be postponed. Bear in mind that a change in lifestyle may be necessary due to decreased income. This could be problematic, creating anxiety about how they will cope. Financial advice is often appreciated.


Prepare for Your Time of Sorrow

Some in the churches have been exemplary in how they have included widows and widowers in their circle of friends. The greatest challenge remains to be aware of this great necessity. Their faithfulness will be rewarded by God. And, at a later date, they will profit from their experience.

To those who are widowed, we want to say: "We want to help you get through this time!"

To those who have shared their experiences with us, I would like to say: "Thank you for making us aware of many things!"

"But Joshua said to the people, 'You cannot serve the LORD, for He is a holy God. He is a jealous God; He will not forgive your transgressions nor your sins. If you forsake the LORD and serve foreign gods, then He will turn and do you harm and consume you, after He has done you good.' And the people said to Joshua, 'No, but we will serve the LORD!'" (Joshua 24:19-21)

Joshua was approaching the end of his life and knew he would soon die. One last time his love to his people drove him to exhort them to make a definite decision whether to serve God or not: "And if it seems evil to you to serve the LORD, choose for yourselves this day whom you will serve, whether the gods which your fathers served that were on the other side of the River, or the gods of the Amorites, in whose land you dwell" (Joshua 24:15). And then he utters the familiar words: "But as for me and my house, we will serve the LORD."

When the Israelites protested that they would follow and serve their God who had brought them out of Egypt, Joshua countered with the astounding words: "You cannot serve the LORD"! Why would he make such a negative assertion in his last words to his people?

You cannot serve the LORD

Joshua knew his people. He saw that many of them hadn't even cared enough to seek their own inheritance in Canaan. He thought back to their constant lack of faith, to their many disobediences and deviations from God's law. Repeatedly they had turned from God and troubled Him. And now, when they publicly promised to serve God, Joshua maintained that they wouldn't be able to!

Imagine that someone would have said to you before you became a Christian: "Don't even bother seeking salvation. I know you won't be able to serve God!" Would we have taken the step, or would we have just given up? "If a pastor already tells me that there is no hope for me, why even try?"

Why did Joshua make such a harsh statement? Did he want to discourage the Israelites? Was he a bitter old man who couldn't stand to see them succeed, or for whom the people could never do things well enough? No, he looked at their spiritual stance, at their desires and practices, and he knew that in this condition they would not be committed or faithful.

"If you forsake the LORD and serve foreign gods, then He will turn and do you harm and consume you, after He has done you good" (Joshua 24:20). Joshua knew they weren't ready to serve such a holy God. "You cannot serve the LORD, for He is a holy God. He is a jealous God; He will not forgive your transgressions nor your sins" (Verse 19). "And the people said to Joshua, 'No, but we will serve the LORD!" (Verse 21).

Joshua wanted to bring them to the point where they would serve the Lord with all their heart, with total commitment, and with all their strength. There could be no carelessness or compromise. They needed to be consecrated and sold out to God once and for all. Only then would they succeed, and only then would the following generations be faithful to God.

Joshua was so concerned about his people! He would no longer be there to show them the way. He, who had so often been called into the presence of God with Moses and had even been commanded to keep watch in the Sanctuary when Moses returned to the people, now had to abandon his people to their fate.



And yet, God was there! What could he, as a man, even do to protect God's people? Again and again he had had to realize that all his efforts to turn the hearts of the people to God had been in vain! And therefore, with his last words to them, he sought to compel them to an irrevocable decision: "We will serve the LORD!" Joshua knew that God had to be among them. God needed to work on and in their hearts. They needed to have his own "As for me and my house, we will serve the LORD" engraved in their hearts as their passion and watchword.

"We will serve the LORD"

What about us as church of God in the 21st century? Is that also our firm assertion? Is that our irrevocable commitment, come what may? "We will serve the Lord!"

What does that entail?

- 1. To serve God will all of our heart and all of our soul. In Israel's story, they often served God and idols! God and Baal! God and Moloch! God and the world! Sadly, that doesn't seem to be different in the lives of many "Christians" in our time. But it is not possible to serve God in this manner. Jesus proclaimed that no man can serve two masters, and we will not manage it either. Only if we, our young people, our children, all of us, serve the Lord with all our heart and with all our love will we continue as God's people!
- 2. As a result of the Israelites' commitment to serve the Lord, Joshua brought them into a covenant with God. They entered into it with a promise to remain in it forever: "The LORD, our God, we will serve and

Him we will obey." Then they set up a large stone under an oak tree next to the Tabernacle as a witness to their words. It was to always remind them of their commitment: "We belong to God! We are in a covenant with Him, to serve Him and be His alone." Dear Reader, won't you also covenant with God to be His completely and unconditionally forever?

- 3. Along with the covenant, Joshua included terms and laws for Israel to honor. If we want to serve God, His Word must be integrated into our daily lives. It must become as much a part of us as breathing and eating. We live in a time where great efforts are made to discount all rules and designate them as legalistic. But God gave His people laws in order that they could serve Him. In the New Testament it has become the law of Christ, which remains a law of holiness and love. If it is truly our desire: "We will serve the LORD," then our love to Him will drive us to find His holy will for our life. Only in holiness is it possible to truly serve God.
- 4. "We will serve the LORD" also means being faithful to Him. Faithful in great things and small things. Faithful unto death, come what may. Faithful, when all others forsake Him. Also faithful in prayer, faithful in church attendance, faithful in tithing, faithful in commitment and in our love to Him.

Many things could be added here, but if it is our heart's-desire: "As for me and my house, we will serve the LORD," God will surely help us succeed. And we will never regret having lived such a life, with such a commitment: "We will serve the LORD!"

Fear in Time of the Coronavirus

"Let not your heart be troubled; you believe in God, believe also in Me." (John 14:1)

o have fear and troubled hearts is only human. There are many types of fear, depending on the situation. All of us encounter fear, whether it is in a mild or more acute form.

The situation surrounding COVID-19 provokes fear in many people. It seems not only individuals but whole societies have been riddled and driven by fear and panic. I spoke with two former colleagues, and when I noticed their great fear of getting this illness, I took the opportunity to talk to them about God, who is Lord of all.

In Argentina, where I live, doctors, nurses, and truck drivers have all been affected. A certain doctor here was infected with the coronavirus, and shortly thereafter, her car was set on fire. An anonymous note saying: "Away with infected rats" was left nearby. In another case, a nurse found a memo at her door asking her and her daughter to leave the neighborhood so that they would not infect others. One doctor commented that these cases clearly demonstrate both fear and ignorance.

Truck drivers have been forbidden to use the washrooms at gas stations or to buy anything at the mini-markets. There was a family who was marked and threatened after a member of the family was admitted to the hospital. This person had an illness unrelated to COVID-19. These are just a few cases that show the extreme fear and even panic associated with the coronavirus.

What does the Bible say about fear?

The Bible tells us that fear was something that people

have always had throughout history. Situations that brought fear and panic came up again and again. Not only sinners, but also godly men and women experienced fear. Yet fear is also a weapon that the enemy of our souls uses to influence and mislead us.

When Queen Jezebel swore that she would kill the prophet Elijah, "he arose and ran for his life" (1 Kings 19:3).

David, a man of God and a valiant hero, also experienced periods of fear in his life. In 1 Samuel 21:12, we read, "David took these words to heart, and was very much afraid of Achish the king of Gath." David also fled from his son Absalom in great fear.

The disciples had great fear when they found themselves in a storm on the Sea of Galilee and Jesus was asleep in the boat. "Then His disciples came to Him and awoke Him, saying, 'Lord, save us! We are perishing!" (Matthew 8:25)

The Christian and COVID-19

How do we as God's children react to this present situation? What kind of attitude are we to have? In His Word, God has given us direction, help, and promises for every situation. In difficult times such as these, we should make use of these. It is God who holds the whole world in His hands. "The earth is the Lord's, and all its fullness, the world and those who dwell therein" (Psalm 24:1). God knows of the situation we are living in. 

Unique experiences during the COVID-19 pandemic

since the beginning of 2020, the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic has taken hold of led to unusual patterns of behavior. Existential fears have become very real; the future seems uncer-

the world. Very few countries have been exempt from it. Public life has, for the most part, come to a standstill over the past weeks.

Observations of Society

The last few weeks have shown how easily people in our day are influenced. The inundation of information has overburdened many and tain. People have been keeping an appropriate physical distance but have also outwardly and inwardly become estranged from one another. Some have been astonishingly quick to monitor people in their surroundings and inform on them.

Of note is the widespread uncertainty about the actual situation. What is really true? How can we correctly assess the real situation? On one hand, information from public sources and "reliable" media coverage have painted an extremely dangerous and unsettling picture of the coronavirus. Then there have been increasingly serious remarks and questions from scientists and experts who have come to completely different conclusions. What is really the truth, and how do we come to that conclusion?

However, these weeks have also shown us some positive things. Everything has somehow become slower-paced. Many people have begun to think not only of themselves but also of others and to be open towards those who are weaker and older. It has often been expressed that everyone feels they are in the same situation and therefore, people turn towards each other. Virtues such as showing helpfulness, care, friendliness, and patience barely seemed to exist in the last few years. However, in this special time, they seem to have turned up again and allowed society to appear in a friendlier light.



Even the willingness to talk about serious issues has increased. Some people have understood this illness to be a word from God, and they have opened themselves to thoughts about eternity. Others have searched for quiet and comfort for their souls in prayer.

Our Church Life

A great awareness of the spread of the coronavirus led to many countries imposing stay-at-home orders or at least prohibiting contact with others. Events with over 10 people were prohibited nearly everywhere. This affected the corporate worship services of all faith groups in many countries, from Kazakhstan to Germany, North America to South America. The goal of these measures was to reduce the spread of the virus that may have occurred through close contact with others.

As a church, our view is that this particular case is not one in which our faith has been suppressed, but we have understood these directives to be a responsible action by the government. Therefore, many congregations have refrained from


holding corporate worship services (Romans 13:1 and Titus 3:1).

Worship Services in an Unprecedented Way

Although the usual corporate worship services are no longer possible for the majority of our congregations, all have tried to preach God's Word in various ways, for every soul requires nourishment and encouragement.

A number of congregations had begun transmitting worship services online over the last few years. Over livestream, Internet radio, and via a phone connection, brothers and sisters and those who were interested in listening were given the opportunity to take part in the services indirectly. Due to our changed situation, livestreaming has suddenly taken on the leading role.

On Sundays and during the week, the doors of many of the houses of the Lord have remained locked. Only a small group, along with the pastor, has been able to hold a worship service in the church meeting house, which has then been transmitted over the Internet. At some locations, only the pastor and the necessary technical team have been present; at others, a few singers and prayer warriors have been there for support. Video recordings of songs and other presentations, which are then played during the worship services, have become important. In all locations, it has been a new undertaking to hold children's services and youth meetings online, but here too God has given grace and guidance. For the first time, the Easter Conference in Hamm, Germany, which has been held annually for over 60



years, and the Pentecost Conference in Herford, Germany were replaced by livestreaming at the usual worship service times, arranged by the various local congregations in Germany.

It has been difficult to fellowship with others in the congregation. Even though small home-based services have been held among families during livestreaming, the corporate prayer of believers has been missing. For this reason, one congregation has been holding prayer meetings over Zoom (similar to Skype) with congregants. Believers have had the opportunity to participate in prayer after the Bible study. In a few other locations, services have always been held over Skype/Zoom to facilitate discussion amongst congregation members and to pray together.

true fellowship, communal singing and prayer, loving greetings and hugs—especially because not all congregation members are able to use these technologies and therefore cannot take part in these online gatherings.

What We Have Learned through This

This time has taught us to be thankful. We took all of the gifts of "normal" life for granted: the blessed worship services, fellowship, being together as a family of God, freedom, and prosperity. We often didn't treasure the worship services as much as we should have. The church of God is much more than a building, corporate worship services, or fellowship with children of God. It is the body of Christ, through which the Holy

congregations, God has closed the door to corporate worship services for now, but another door, which until now had only opened a crack, has been opened wide. Online transmission of the gospel truths in Word and song are an important way to reach people with the message of salvation in this time. Many congregations have taken huge steps forward in this regard over the past few weeks and have become more visible. In the future, we should continue to work intensely in order to bring people to godly light through this means.

We have also had to learn that each individual is responsible for the development of his or her soul. It is not the pastor and not the church that primarily cares for your soul. In all battles, temptations, and distractions, each child of God must personally carry his soul in his own hands and care for its health. So that we are not deceived, it is vital that we remain grounded in the biblical truth and live in it (Ephesians 4:13-16).

Crises come and go, but the Rock, Jesus Christ, on which the church is built, remains unchangeable. Whichever storms may confront the church, God holds and protects her with His omnipotence. We can all be at peace and entrust ourselves to His grace and godly wisdom.

Endurance of every kind requires strength. It is very important for the child of God to have the spiritual power, the grace of God. Only through them can it fight the spiritual battle, win and achieve the eternal goal. Jesus said: "He who persists to the end will be saved" (Matthew 24:13).

There is no endurance without strength. If the Christian wants to have perseverance for God in his spiritual tasks, he must accept the power of God through faith. This will enable him to overcome the world, as John says: "Who is it that overcomes the world, if not the one who believes that Jesus is the Son of God?" (1 John 5:5).

The apostles were faithful to the end. Why? Because they could say: "We have all taken from his abundance, grace for grace" (John 1:16), that means strength for strength. That was the secret of their perseverance. We face many difficulties in life, and by nature people are more inclined to give up than to hold out. But what we cannot do, Christ can do through us. One evening, discouraged and despondent by repeated defeats, Robert the Bruce, King of Scotland (1274-1329), reached a poor hut in which he wanted to rest until the following morning. There he lay on a little straw, his hands under his head and covered with his coat, until the following morning.

When the day broke, he looked at the roof structure covered with cobwebs. For a while he forgot what seemed to be a failed undertaking and watched a spider try to spin a thread from one rafter to another. She failed six times. She tried again for the seventh time,

and she finally did it! "The seventh time!" said Bruce, jumping to his feet. "I take this as a lesson for me to have persistence in my adversities. I will make another attempt for the freedom and independence of my beloved country!"

History reports the result, namely that Bruce never had to face major defeats again.

Many difficulties can only be overcome with perseverance. Therefore: "Be faithful to death, so I will give you the crown of life" (Revelation 2:10).
