Dear Reader,

Yes, let us be rooted and grounded in God, serving Him faithfully, with all our hearts. That is the message of Jesus Christ and the will of God.

"And what do You ask for all these glorious gifts?"


"Her sins, her bad conscience, everything that inwardly suppresses and torments her. That is what I ask for."

he Bible teaches that it is every believer's blood-bought privilege to be spiritually reborn in God, and to be sanctified through baptism in the Holy Spirit. With Christ's sacrifice on Calvary, God made it possible for us to be saved from our sins.

Christ died not only for our sins to be forgiven but also for our hearts to be fully purified. "The blood of Jesus Christ His Son cleanses us from all sin" (1 John 1:7).

In His High-Priestly Prayer, Jesus prayed not only for His current disciples, but for all who would come to believe through them, that "they also may be sanctified by the truth" (John 17:19b). He also said that His leaving would benefit His followers by making way for the Spirit to come and live in them and be with them eternally. Finally, shortly before His ascension to Heaven, He ordered them to stay in Jerusalem until they received the power of the Spirit.

Trusting in His promise and obeying His command, they remained in the upper room and waited as one. Their waiting was not in vain, and "when the Day of Pentecost had fully come they were all filled with the Holy Spirit" (Acts 2:1–4).

They could no longer be who they had been before. The truth that had been hidden was now revealed to them. Their weak and faltering hearts were filled to the brim with new strength. Their message was heavenly dynamite. They witnessed with great boldness. Their listeners had to acknowledge that something extraordinary had taken place and continued to take place. It caused a stir, and with good reason, because a key event which the prophets had already spoken of centuries before had really come to be. The Kingdom of God had arrived in all its power, and the people of God had

come into their own. This was God's inheritance for His children. The spiritual Israel had come to Canaan, the long-promised land of rest.

If our report were to end at this point in the story, we would have no special cause for joy. The best thing of all is that this coming of the Holy Spirit extends to us today. As the Holy Spirit explains through Peter, "The promise is to you and to your children, and to all who are afar off, as many as the Lord our God will call" (Acts 2:39).

The fact that this coming of the Holy Spirit and His indwelling did not end on the day of Pentecost is made clear in the case of Saul of Tarsus, who also serves as proof that the Holy Spirit only comes upon believers, i.e. people who are already saved and who have experienced forgiveness for their sins. It is hard to deny that Saul's conversion happened on the way to Damascus. Up to that moment he had been a blasphemer, persecutor, and man of violence. Yet now he said to Jesus, "Lord, what do You want me to do?" (Acts 9:6). Three days later, Ananias came to him and said, "Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on the road as you came, has sent me that you may receive your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit" (Acts 9:17).

There are other examples that show us the same thing, like the Samaritans in Acts 8, Cornelius and his household in Acts 10, and the disciples in Ephesus in Acts 19.

This is how the believers in the church came into their blood-bought inheritance. The strength they gained this way marked them wherever they went and in whatever they did. It was this strength that inspired others to speak of them as "these who have turned the world upside down" (Acts 17:6). Wherever they went, something happened to jolt entire regions of people out of their ignorance; they caused a spiritual revolution.

Thanks be to God that receiving the Holy Spirit in His fullness is not the privilege of the few but a right enjoyed by all who follow Jesus. Speaking to the Ephesians, Paul very directly instructed them to "be filled with the Spirit" (Ephesians 5:18). The apathy and worldliness prevalent in so many individuals and congregations today can be traced back to people ignoring this instruction. This also explains why the lives of many Christian's are stuck in infancy, why many draw no real joy from serving God, why so many lives bear no fruit, and why there are so few people leading spiritual lives and so many walking according to the flesh, to use Paul's terminology (Romans 8:4). Many are children in Christ rather than grown men and women in God.


Even worse is that they are content with this state of affairs, going so far as to reject the idea that there is something better and greater in store for them. Too many people are content to live without many of the privileges afforded to them by the Lord. They do not recognize that we live in the best of times—not only

in the time of grace but also in the glorious fulfillment of this promise. As Jesus says, "And the glory which You gave Me I have given them" (John 17:22). This means that we can be full of glory and grace, just like our Master.

It is true, we need to meet certain conditions before the Spirit can come in His fullness; but do not let this fact obscure how simple it is to receive the fullness of the Spirit. The conditions are: a sincere desire to be filled with the Spirit, an unconditional surrender to the will of God, and the receiving of the Holy Spirit through a simple act of faith. If you are a child of God, you do not need to wait until Pentecost, like the disciples, because the Spirit is already waiting for you, waiting to enter your heart.

But do not seek only influence or power or comfort or joy; seek to be filled with the Holy Spirit Himself. The Holy Spirit is a person. When He arrives, He brings strength. When He enters you, you gain not only comfort but also the Comforter. He brings lasting joy, joy in the Holy Spirit. His presence makes us holy.

Give yourself fully to Him, and He will give all of Himself to you.



The Way of *Sacrifice*

In Genesis 22, we read how Abraham got ready for a difficult journey. He rose early in the morning, saddled his donkey, and took along two of his servants, as well as his son and the wood needed for the sacrifice. He may have trembled as his hand took the knife that would slay his beloved son.

Abraham did not hesitate. He could have procrastinated a bit before obeying the command given to him. He could have somewhat prolonged the days to be with his son just a while longer. Yet in order to fulfill the call of God, he "rose early" (Genesis 22:3).

We too must "rise early" if we wish to heed God's call. Obedience is the first step in following the Lord. It is deceiving to consider delaying it a bit, to enjoy life, to be with a loved one a while longer. If your attitude is to procrastinate and do it later, and you think you will follow the Lord wholeheartedly someday but not yet, then beware. A well-known proverb says that the way to hell is paved with good intentions. The "half-way" path and the "do-it-later" road do not lead where we should go.

Abraham had a three-day journey, and then he saw "the place afar off" (Genesis 22:4). If we go forward and obediently do what God commands, then we too will see the glory of the Lord, even if from afar. In following Christ, we may not see the fullness of His glory right away, but as we travel the road in patient perseverance, God will allow us to have a glimpse of His glory. As Abraham was journeying with his son, he buried many a hope and wish deep inside himself. If you follow the Lord in obedience without complaining and defiance, then you too will be able to lift up your eyes like Abraham and see God's plan.

After Abraham left his servants in the valley, he and Isaac journeyed the last portion to the mountain alone. Abraham took along the wood, fire, and knife. This was the final preparation.

We, too, must be prepared in order to bring a pleasing sacrifice to God. Look at Abraham. He left his ser-

vants behind. You may have to leave your best friends behind in order to sacrifice to the Lord. It is not easy to climb to the top of the mountain, because the goal is lofty. The way before us can either go up, or it can go down. We can decide. Let us resolve to take along the wood, fire, and knife and, despite all temptation and obstacles, let us go onward and upward.


With each resolve according to God's plan, our character will be strengthened, and we will be empowered to take the next steps. A successful life is not unhappy and unfulfilled. The higher the goal, the more satisfaction it brings. Go for the heights. Only by taking the right steps and going forward can the impossible become possible.

Then Isaac said, "My father where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" (Genesis 22:7) Here is a question that hits the wounded heart with full force. Where is the sacrifice?

Dear Reader, where is your sacrifice? What is it that wounds your heart? Where and what is your beloved Isaac? God has asked Isaac to be the sacrifice. Take your beloved Isaac and go to the top of the mountain. The Lord does not want your sacrifice before your will is completely and harmoniously encompassed into the will of God.

"God will provide for Himself the lamb for a burnt offering" (Genesis 22:8). That is the confidence of one who has triumphed over temptation. The temptation has been successfully overcome. The battle is over. The top of the mountain has been reached. Below lies the land of Canaan, the land given to the generations that follow.

How precious are the words of Paul, when we can say with him, "I have fought the good fight" (1 Timothy 4:7). Do you belong to those who have fought the good fight? Do you belong to those who have triumphed over temptation? The Promised Land lies before you. Yes, you will possess it. You will live because you have died. Here is the place where you too can build an altar. This place was called Moriah. Centuries



later, Solomon built a temple for the Lord there, the holy place where God's presence was to reside among His people. You too can become a part of the temple of the living God.

"The Angel of the Lord called to him from heaven" (Genesis 22:11). The journey of Abraham is a drama that even the angels watched. They see your journey and your battle as well, watching in order to assist you. It is the Father in heaven Who watches your steps. He loves you and is greatly interested in you. He wants to form your character in order to reveal His secrets to you.

The faith and obedience of Abraham were so cherished by God that He gave him a glimpse into the mystery of God that was in place even before the world began. This mystery was so great that God even gave His own beloved Son, so that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life (John 3:16). Genesis 22 is the shadow seen because of the light of the Gospel. Abraham was given a glimpse into the heart of God.

"Because you have obeyed My voice" (Genesis 22:18), a promise was made to Abraham. Every command of God has the promise of a blessing. Abraham was told to look at the starry sky. The promise made to Abraham became a reality. God's grace is as wide as the heavens. He can repay you a hundredfold for what you have given up for His sake and give you eternal life as well (Mark 10:29-30).

Abraham was given a glimpse of his natural inheritance. He saw his seed grow. He was told that his offspring would be as numerous as the stars in the sky, his reward for being faithful. When he began his journey, he may have thought that God did not recognize his plight. Yet later he named the mountain "The-LORD-Will-Provide" (Genesis 22:14). Dear Reader, take courage and go forward. It is worth giving your all to the Lord. God sees you. The promise that "in My Father's house are many mansions" (John 14:2) is a promise for you too.

Are You Sanctified?

any do not have a clear understanding of the doctrine of sanctification. Some are quite confused and cannot even form a proper concept of the entire experience of sanctification. They are in the dark regarding this experience because they lack proper teaching. But is this uncertainty and insecurity necessary?

Many would say in response to the question, "Are you sanctified?" that after their conversion they went forward to the altar again, and therefore they assume they have attained sanctification. However, this is no proof, nor does it give any assurance that we are sanctified. But then, how can we know we are truly sanctified?

Sanctification is called a second work of grace. This dualism in salvation is due to the reality that sin is present in the human heart in two forms: the inherited tendency to sin which we all possess since natural birth, and the sin we have actually committed. In all of us, there is an inherited inclination to sin; but then we have also willingly and knowingly done evil after reaching the age of accountability. These two forms of sin are different from each other, and they must not be regarded as one and the same.

Adam and Eve were created righteous, just, and holy, but they fell from their high position, thereby plunging all of humanity into sin. From them, all their descendants inherited sin, or an evil nature. Clearly, we had already fallen short of complete holiness, although we came into the world completely innocent.

Jesus teaches that the born-again person is like a child in one sense. "Unless you are converted and become as little children, you will by no means enter the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 18:3). So whoever has repented, confessed his sins, and obtained forgiveness is converted. He has returned to the innocence from

which he has fallen. But just as the innocent child is one step below the original state of true holiness, so is the convert, who is now like a child. Scripture then exhorts us to "go on to perfection." It also tells us that "by one offering [Christ] has perfected forever those who are being sanctified" (Hebrews 10:14).

The Apostle John clearly teaches that one must be born of God. He also teaches that those who have become children of God through the new birth still need further purification. "Beloved, now we are children of God; and it has not yet been revealed what we shall be, but we know that when He is revealed, we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is. And every one who has this hope in Him purifies himself, just as He is pure" (1 John 3:2-3). In Ephesians 5:25-26, Paul says that Christ gave Himself for the church "that He might sanctify her."

The promise of a second work of grace was given to the disciples by Jesus Himself three times in very specific ways. First, He promised to allow us to "be pruned" by the "vinedresser." "I am the true vine, and My Father the vinedresser. Every branch in Me that does not bear fruit He takes away; and every branch that bears fruit He prunes, that it may bear more fruit" (John 15:1-2). The second promise is that Jesus would ask the Father to sanctify them, to give them the Holy Spirit. And then Jesus asks the Father, "Sanctify them by Your truth. Your word is truth" (John 17:17).

We are sanctified when we receive the Holy Spirit. And Jesus promised the Holy Spirit to all who believe in Him. Before His ascension, He said to His disciples, "But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be witnesses to Me" (Acts 1:8).

The Holy Spirit purifies the heart from the innate inclination to sin, and He also gives us power to live

and work for the Lord. Therefore, the question we should ask ourselves is, "Have I received the Holy Spirit?" If we have received the Holy Spirit, then we are also sanctified.

Paul tells us what the fruit of the Spirit is: "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control" (Galatians 5:22-23). If we have the Spirit of God, then we have His fruits. To determine if we are truly sanctified, we must examine ourselves to see if we are producing the fruit of the Spirit.

Some people say this is not so easy to determine. It seems to me that the Apostle Paul anticipated this problem. To make it easier for us to test ourselves, he wrote 1 Corinthians 13. He has taken one fruit of the Spirit—love—and dissected it, so to speak. He has shown the nature and characteristics of love.

If we are sanctified, we have the Holy Spirit. And when we have Him, we also bring forth the fruit of the Spirit. Paul tells us that love is long-suffering, patient, free of envy, it does not boast, it does not puff itself up, it does not seek its own advantage. It is not embittered, it bears no grudge, it does not rejoice in wrongdoing. Rather, it rejoices when it sees truth and justice prevail.

What does your life look like when you look at it in the light of these scriptures? Are you demonstrating the fruit of the Spirit? If you do not possess that which brings love into your life, you do not have love; and if you do not have love, clearly you have not received the Holy Spirit, and are therefore not sanctified.

If you are born again and are a child of God, lay yourself completely on the altar of the Lord as a living sacrifice. Give yourself completely to the Lord with all that you have and are, and He will give you the Holy Spirit if you ask Him.

he disciples had experienced the resurrection of the Lord. After that, He instructed them for forty days about the kingdom of God. Now the day of departure was drawing near. In the future, the disciples were to take responsibility for spreading the word concerning the kingdom of God.

Jesus Gathers with His Disciples

"Later He appeared to the eleven as they sat at the table; and He rebuked their unbelief and hardness of heart, because they did not believe those who had seen Him after He had risen" (Mark 16:14).

At the last gathering, the Lord had important things to say to His disciples. When the Lord speaks, we should always listen carefully. What did the Lord have to say to the disciples? It was not praise but a rebuke of their unbelief. They had not believed those who proclaimed the resurrection. Did the disciples accept the exhortation? Yes. The firm decision was made, we will doubt no more. Do all the listeners in the churches today accept rebuke and exhortation? Unfortunately not. Let us remember the seven letters and what the Lord said to the churches at that time. Let us ask the Lord to tell us personally what we should be doing better.

Jesus Sends out His Disciples as Evangelists

"And He said to them, 'Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. He who believes and is baptized will be saved; but he who does not believe will be condemned'" (Mark 16:15,16).

It was the disciples' task to spread the gospel. Jesus had commanded the disciples to wait in Jerusalem until Pentecost, when they would be equipped with power from the Holy Spirit. No one should go into the

preaching ministry who is not filled with the power of the Holy Spirit.

After being filled with the Holy Spirit, it was time for the disciples to obey the divine comand to "go into all the world." They should not just stay in Jerusalem. The disciples were obedient to the Great Commission. Just staying at home would have been the most comfortable thing to do, but the disciples took on hardship, contempt, persecution, and imprisonment in order to be obedient to the command of the Lord.

The Great Commission also included baptism. Unfortunately, people twist this command and put baptism first. Only a born-again Christian may be baptized, not a sinner. In this verse, the way to salvation and condemnation is shown.

The statement is short, concise, precise, unambiguous, and clear. There are only two ways. He who remains unbelieving will be condemned. On Judgment Day, the loving and righteous God will be the righteous Judge.

Jesus Walks with His Church

"And these signs will follow those who believe: In My name they will cast out demons; they will speak with new tongues; they will take up serpents; and if they drink anything deadly, it will by no means hurt them; they will lay their hands on the sick, and they will recover" (Mark 16:17-18).

Christ often cast out evil spirits from possessed people and healed many sick people. The Lord also conferred this authority on His disciples and His people. The disciples spoke in "new tongues" after the Holy Spirit was poured out. All the listeners understood the proclamation in their language. These new tongues were not gibberish that no one understood but understandable languages.

The Lord sees when the lives of His children are in danger, as we read in Acts 28:3-6, "But when Paul had gathered a bundle of sticks and laid them on the fire, a viper came out because of the heat, and fastened on his hand. So when the natives saw the creature hanging from his hand, they said to one another, "No doubt this man is a murderer, whom, though he has escaped the sea, yet justice does not allow to live." But he shook off the creature into the fire and suffered no harm." The Lord is the Lord over life and death.

Even a deadly drink should not harm them. Before our first trip to Africa, we were required to obtain a vaccination against yellow fever. The doctor from the health department mentioned the side effects of the vaccination and concluded by saying, "And you could die. Would you like to have the vaccination?" I answered, "Yes," thinking of the Word "and if they drink anything deadly, it will by no means hurt them." The vaccination did not harm me, for which I thank God.

"They will lay their hands on the sick, and they will recover." Someone commented to me that divine healing only applied to the disciples. I pointed out that Christ said, "they will lay their hands." If it was only meant to apply to the disciples at that time, then Christ should have said "you will lay your hands." This man responded by saying that one should not dwell on a word like that. In James 5:13-16, God's Word tells us what to do in the event of sickness.

The Lord's Great Commission includes the assurance that God walks with His church, He sees our need, and He even wants to heal our bodily sicknesses. Let us hold this in faith and not doubt the Word. Every divine healing and every miracle happens because of the faith and prayers of God's people.

After the Lord's last words to His disciples, the Lord ascended to heaven. One last look followed, and the Lord became smaller and smaller among the clouds until they did not see Him anymore. Acts 1:9 reads, "And when He had spoken these things, while they watched, He was taken up, and a cloud received Him out of their sight." Mark 16:19 further reports that the Lord sat down at the right hand of God.

Jesus Watches over His Church

Christ walked with the disciples and constantly taught them for three and a half years. He was visible among them. Now, Jesus is looking at everything and at all the churches from heaven. We read in Revelation 2:1, "These things says He who holds the seven stars in His right hand, who walks in the midst of the seven golden lampstands." The Lord walks among us; He walks with us; He sees what is needed. The Lord carries His children through ups and downs and is the focus of their lives and nothing else.

But other things can become the focal point in a congregation: musical performances, sports activities, individuals, and more. But only One should be the center of attention, and that is Christ alone. If this is not the case, then Christ will overturn the lampstand in the congregation.

The Lord introduces Himself to the church at Laodicea, according to Revelation 3:14, with the following words: "These things says the Amen, the Faithful and True Witness, the Beginning of the creation of God." Absolutely nothing escapes this Faithful Witness.

Christ watches over the purity of doctrine in the church. Jesus watches over the personal purity of the individual. The Lord watches over every work in the church.

In conclusion, we ask ourselves the question:

What Does the Lord Expect from His Church?



You are Sanctified

Unfortunately, there is a lack of clarity about the doctrine of sanctification in general within Christianity. Many attempt to sanctify their lives on their own; but God wants to do this work in the hearts of His children.

of some of the serious sins in which they had indulged. Yet that life was behind them now. They had broken with their old lives and started anew. This had become very visible, and therefore, the apostle could say, "But you were washed, but you were sanctified, but you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus and by the Spirit of our God." They had full salvation, which encompasses sanctification.

The experience of sanctification is taught very clearly in the Bible. However, there are varying opinions regarding the term "sanctification." By far, most Christians hold to the opinion that sanctification is something to be pursued as long as one lives. However, according to that opinion, sanctification would have to be so unattainable that it could not be achieved in this life. But then Jesus would have prayed for something that would not have been achievable. Thus, Paul saying, "You are sanctified" would not be plausible. Wouldn't God's character of truthfulness then be called into question? We should all be convinced of the fact that God never promises anything He would not be able to give us. Through many scriptures of the Bible, the fact is sufficiently established that sanctification, as well as salvation, is an experience for this life. Since salvation is something definite and certain, so is sanctification.

A regrettable lack of clarity about sanctification comes from the incomprehensible teaching by some that on the one hand, conversion exists for the purpose of forgiveness; but on the other hand, "daily repentance" is preached, which states that man, despite his conversion, remains bound to sin. Precisely for this reason, he must pursue sanctification and strive to rid himself of his sins on a daily basis. From this incomplete/incorrect point of view, sanctification is presented as a constant putting away of sin and is therefore related solely to the power and ability of man.

However, according to John 15:1-6, this kind of sanctification is clearly refuted. Here, Jesus referred to the image of the vine and the branches. He told us that His Father will separate the fruitless branches from the vine and throw them into the fire. But He will cleanse the fruit-bearing branches so they can bear more fruit.

This is precisely the purpose of sanctification. It is not the constant taking off of self-inflicted sins, but its purpose is the cleansing from the original sin and for a deeper spiritual life which results in bearing more fruit.

Another effect is that it frees the born-again heart from carnal attitudes, such as stubbornness, selfishness, pride, vanity, the desire for recognition, and oth-



er such tendencies. These things stand in the way of bearing spiritual fruit and must be eliminated. As long as this carnal mind remains in our hearts, our usefulness in the service of the Lord will remain greatly hindered. The lives of many of God's children could be far more useful, fruit-bearing, and blessed if they would seek and experience sanctification as outlined in Scripture.

The carnal mind is also a great obstacle for the harmonious coexistence of God's children. Much hardship, friction, destruction, and suffering among the people of God is due to the unspiritual, carnal mind. Sanctification, however, does not make us insensitive, unfeeling people, but it certainly saves the children of God from human power struggles, unspiritual actions, unforgiveness, and the like. The sanctified person resists such willful activity.

Jesus knew about these dangers, but He also knew about the high value and great necessity of this experience. Therefore, shortly before His death, He prayed earnestly for the sanctification of His disciples. Before His return to the Father, He admonished them to remain in Jerusalem until they experienced the filling of the power of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost.

Sanctification, as taught in the Bible, is a work of

God on the heart of the born-again believer. Just as no one can attain salvation in his own strength, neither can sanctification be attained. Jesus' request for the sanctification of His disciples was addressed directly to His Father. "Sanctify them," He said, which expressly shows that the Father was to accomplish this work in them. In the same way, Paul had addressed the need for sanctification in his letter to the church at Thessalonica, writing, "Now may the God of peace Himself sanctify you completely" (1 Thessalonians 5:23). It is very clear that sanctification is an exclusive work of God.

Sanctification also has a human side. Whoever desires this experience must be willing to surrender his will to the will of God; he must become a sacrifice on the altar of the Lord. This sacrifice must be "a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable to God" (see Romans 12:1). Faith, an inner desire, and corresponding prayer are also necessary for this experience. There is no doubt that the people of Corinth had walked this biblical path. They had experienced sanctification, and Paul could say, "You are sanctified."

May God grant that many more of His children would recognize the need for sanctification, seek it according to the biblical mandate, and then testify, "We are sanctified!"

The Holy Spirit in the Life of Christians

Te live in a time when many sincere souls are confused and believe they have received the fullness of the Holy Spirit at the moment of salvation. Salvation is effected by the Holy Spirit, and the child of God is under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Yes, "as many as are led by the Spirit of God, these are sons of God" (Romans 8:14), and "if anyone does not have the Spirit of Christ, he is not His" (v.9). Also, in verse sixteen we read, "The Spirit Himself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God." But the baptism of the Holy Spirit is only for children of God.

Someone once wanted an explanation about the difference between the Holy Spirit's testimony that we are God's children and the Holy Spirit's baptism. I gave him the following illustration:

Before someone can move into a house, the house must first be built. He may call it his house before it is finished. But only when it is finished can he live in it. It is the same with the child of God who already belongs to God and is led by the Spirit of God. But the Holy Spirit has not yet fully entered the heart.

The outpouring of the Holy Spirit is a special experience after being born again. Aside from the day of Pentecost, when Peter told the crowd "Repent, and let every one of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins; and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit" (Acts 2:38), we do not have a single passage in God's Word that might suggest that man is simultaneously born again and baptized with the Holy Spirit.

The prophecy of Joel 3:1-2 was literally fulfilled on the Day of Pentecost. In his sermon on the day of Pentecost, Peter says, "But this is what was spoken by the prophet Joel: 'And it shall come to pass in the last days, says God, that I will pour out of My Spirit on all flesh; your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, your young men shall see visions, your old men shall dream dreams. And on My menservants and on My maidservants I will pour out My Spirit in those days; and they shall prophesy'" (Acts 2:16-18).

Those gathered at that time were all children of God; all were born again. Someone may object and

point out that Peter fell when Jesus was taken captive and that he denied Him. But Peter repented bitterly, and Jesus forgave him. He also appointed him to His apostleship before Pentecost.

We are living in the age of the Holy Spirit. The Holy Spirit is the third person of the Godhead. He is a teacher, a comforter, He is eternal, like God the Father and the Son. He is omniscient, omnipresent, and omnipotent. He can be grieved and angered. The Holy Spirit is more than an influence. He is a guide and teacher into all truth. He chastises and convicts man and brings about His regeneration. We are sanctified through and through when He is poured into our hearts.

The Holy Spirit calls the ministers and sends them out. "Now in the church that was at Antioch there were certain prophets and teachers: Barnabas, Simeon who was called Niger, Lucius of Cyrene, Manaen who had been brought up with Herod the tetrarch, and Saul. As they ministered to the Lord and fasted, the Holy Spirit said, 'Now separate to Me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them.' Then, having fasted and prayed, and laid hands on them, they sent them away" (Acts 13:1-4).

The Holy Spirit also gives them the messages to speak. He organizes the church and unites its members. "For by one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—whether Jews or Greeks, whether slaves or free—and have all been made to drink into one Spirit" (1 Corinthians 12:13).

Likewise, the Holy Spirit distributes gifts. "But the manifestation of the Spirit is given to each one for the profit of all" (1 Corinthians 12:7). He pours out the love of God completely into our hearts (see Romans 5:5).

He reminds us of Jesus' words: "But the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My name, He will teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance all things that I said to you" (John 14:26).

It is absolutely necessary for every child of God to receive the Holy Spirit. Without Him, our life will not have the victory it should have. The Holy Spirit also gives power and enables us to serve the Lord. He purifies our hearts, and helps us crucify our egos, thereby allowing the Holy Spirit to take complete control of our lives.

had the privilege of being raised in a Christian home and community. Therefore, . Christian morals and values have always been part of my life, and I never questioned whether or not God existed. Trecently had the privilege of rejoicing with first-time young parents of a newborn son. When this little gift of God was almost six weeks old, I was invited to a baby shower for him. Having two sons and a daughter of our own, I was asked to share a few words at this event about some of our life experiences in raising children. I agreed. Likewise, the opportunity was given to share these thoughts with the readers of the Foundation of Faith.

In no way were we the "perfect" parents. Although we did our best, we weren't always successful in doing what we strived for. We soon realized that each child was unique, and therefore had to be raised in his or her own unique way.

When our children were born, it was our prayer to raise them to the glory of God. Our heart's desire was to set a good example for them so they would love the Lord, serve Him wholeheartedly, and make the Kingdom of God their priority. Beginning at a very young age, we read well-known Bible stories to them, sang with them, and taught them to fold their small hands

to pray. We prayed with them and for them each day. Even to this day, we pray daily for our adult children and for our grandchildren too.

It was important for the children to say "please" and "thank you" for everything they wanted or received, even for the smallest gift. Before they were able to speak, they were shown to hold up their hands and clap when they wanted something.

As we had no parents nearby to watch our children, we took them along wherever we went. While visiting members of our congregation, the children learned to respect the elders, not to interrupt when someone was talking, and not to touch anything that did not belong to them. The children were kept busy with a few toys, books, or Lego blocks which we brought along.

Behavioral skills and simple principles, like telling the truth, were taught. It was important for our children to listen and obey when we asked them to do or not to do something. Consistent actions of discipline were used for them to learn obedience.

Love and encouragement were also important in our household. When the children did something



praiseworthy, they usually received a reward for it: sometimes a word of encouragement, other times a small gift or special toy or gadget they had wished for.

The children learned to be kind to others, especially to show compassion to those who were laughed at or ridiculed or who came from less fortunate homes.

Each child was given age-appropriate tasks around the house. They learned to put away their toys, tidy their room, help clear the table after a meal, load the dishwasher, carry out the garbage, help wash the car, mow the lawn, shovel snow, and so on.

Although we had a very busy schedule, we made a point of taking time as often as possible to do something with each child individually, like playing a game with them, taking them shopping, or working on a project together.

Anything to do with church was just part of our family life. It was a given that all of us were present at the worship services. We not only attended but actively took part in singing and in playing instruments. This also included such things as the annual church

cleaning event, where everyone diligently helped along. Being part of the church also included offering, which was taught at a young age. By doing small jobs like mowing neighbors' lawns or delivering papers, it brought the children joy to donate a portion of the money they earned to the Lord and to support His Kingdom.

It was also important for the children to have good friends who had similar moral values. Several friendships have lasted throughout the years. They cherish many wonderful memories, especially those of camping trips.

This list of how we raised our children could continue, but I'll stop here.

Raising children is a rewarding experience, which makes us smile when we see our children teaching their children similar values.

I wish all parents God's blessings, wisdom, and joy with their boys and girls!

What Does It Mean to Be a "Mother"?

An Address to Young Mothers

Dear Ladies,

I am about to speak to an audience of young mothers. So are you young mothers? I will not and cannot deny that you are young. But whether you are mothers, I am not so sure.

Does this make you uneasy? You say, "But we have children!" Well, yes. But let me explain. The fact that you have children does not make you mothers. Having children is just the beginning. I will attempt to tell you what it means to be a mother. A real mother loves her child so much, from the heart, that she knows exactly what her child needs right in the moment.

Let me clarify with a few illustrations. I know a young mother who gives in to her child every time he becomes defiant. After all, he shouldn't need to pout! But when the child dropped a coffee cup—well, it was a nice collector's cup!—she thrashed him woefully.... Do you think this was right? It was nonsense! In the first case, it would have been better if she had not overlooked her child's defiance. A child is not a golden toy. But with the cup? This was clumsiness, not malice.

A real mother knows what her child needs in that moment, whether it's discipline or a hug.

Let me tell you about my mother.

When I was a schoolboy, we had a math assignment. I dreaded it and didn't feel like making an effort. So I noticed with joy that my throat hurt a little that morning. Hooray! A little sickness! It was nicer to lie in bed and read than to write such a stupid paper. How would Mom respond?

She did not speak a word against my illness. On the contrary, she took it very seriously. She quickly arrived with a horrible, thick, rough, nasty woolen cloth. After tying it around my neck, she said, "Lie very still. Do not read. Sick people must rest completely."

After an hour I had had enough. So I got up, and went to school. You see, her wise and healthy response allowed me to face harsh reality. That's exactly what the boy needed in that hour . . . You laugh? Certainly, but please understand how much wisdom there was in this treatment.

May I tell you another story about my mother? I was already a man at the time of the incident. But even a man remains the child of his mother. I was arrested at a time when the Nazis had control of Germany because I had preached in spite of being forbidden to do so. At that time, pastors were commonly arrested. But whoever was affected was hit hard.

Completely despondent, I was sitting in my cell when a letter was delivered to me. A letter from my mother! Of course it had been opened. My mother had to have anticipated that. But imagine, although she knew the letter would be opened, she had not thought for a moment about the inspection center, only about her son. She wrote, "I am glad you are allowed to suffer for Jesus' sake. I am very proud of you. Just don't become soft. The Lord Jesus can give you strength and power every day" It continued in this vein. I can tell you this was exactly what I needed in that hour—a heart that stood by me without reservation in my shame and loneliness.

You see, this is what "being a mother" means: loving your child from your heart in such a way that you give him exactly what he needs, whether a rough cloth or divine comfort. You feel that being a mother is a great thing. Yes, it is. How any woman wants to be a proper mother without asking God for such wisdom and for such love, I cannot understand. Nothing will come of it. Mothers who choose not to pray are not real mothers.

Clean Up

Clean Up Half-Measures

In the biblical account of this couple, it says, "They brought a portion and laid it at the apostles' feet." Whoever does not surrender his whole life to the Lord Jesus ultimately loses his whole part in the kingdom of heaven. To submit only a part of yourself to the truth of Christ means to ultimately end up under the power of Satan. "Whoever of you does not forsake all that he has cannot be My disciple" (Luke 14:33). Therefore, do away with half-measures.

Clean Up Your Love of Money

The love of money deprived these two deceived people of all their possessions. "But those who desire to be rich fall into temptation and a snare, and into many foolish and harmful lusts which drown men in destruction and perdition" (1 Timothy 6:9). Clean the "love of money" out of your heart. This love of money is an instrument of Satan, designed to cheat God's children out of the everlasting gifts God intended for them.

Clean Up the Craving for Attention

Worldly ambition and an ugly thirst for fame brought this couple down. They wanted to make a big name for

themselves here on earth. They wanted to shine outwardly, even though inwardly they had impure motives. Just as wearing white clothes cannot clean an impure heart, giving a good, but false impression will not keep the judgment of God from you. Rather, let God give you the garment of humility. But first, you must clean up all pride and all showiness. Rid your heart of these evil "poisonous plants." They are from "Satan's garden" and cause death.

Clean Up Any Untruths

How could Ananias and Sapphira think they could deceive God? Lying is evil, but powerless against the penetrating light of divine truth. Clean up all deceit because it does not help you. If you do not want to turn away from all lies, then you will die from them.

Clean Up Friendships that Tempt You to do Evil

With his wife having knowledge of their mutual plan, Ananias went ahead with their plan. "How is it that you have agreed together to test the Spirit of the Lord?" (verse 9), Peter lamented. How terrible it is when people entice one another to commit evil! One has encouraged another to wrongdoing and condemned another to death. Get rid of those whom Satan tries to use to seduce you to evil. Seek to uphold life where Satan wants to sow death.

Clean Up Excuses

Peter asked Ananias, "Why has Satan filled your heart, that you have lied to the Holy Spirit?" (v.3). Why have you allowed the enemy of your soul to manipulate you? Do not seek excuses but stand firmly against all sin. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you.

Clean Up the Idea that God Doesn't Take Things Seriously

How merciful God has been with you this long, even if you have not yet accepted His redemption! He has not yet summoned you before His throne of judgment; but do not let that make you apathetic. Corruption of the heart begins with little sins. Every sin, even the most inconspicuous, carries the germ of corruption. Clean up your sins, even the smallest ones. Bring them to the

cross of Christ and accept the completed work of redemption by your Savior.

Clean Up the Misconception that External Things Will Secure Heaven for You

You may have grown up in Christian circles and may even be a church member. You may have done

many good works here and there. However, only a personal experience of salvation from God counts. "You must be born again," Jesus said. Let go of all false security; do not lean on external things. Jesus wants to free your heart from all sin. Only those who are redeemed by the blood of Jesus will stand before God.

n another occasion, they used elephants to scare the preacher away. "First, the guide approached us with a small one as we were standing on an earthen wall preaching. The animal majestically refused, but the guide drove it closer to us by force. I hollered at him and frightened the elephant, which ran right into the wall and then slowly lumbered past me.

"The next day, four exceptionally large elephants appeared. One elephant without a rider charged wildly among the others. Many ran away, but then the animals turned on us. Two of them were still distracted; the other two just barely missed us. The Lord gave us grace, even while we trembled, to stand firmly at our post. This made an impression on the people."
