

# God Wants To Give More

"For the grace of God that brings salvation has appeared to all men, teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly in the present age, looking for the blessed hope and glorious appearing of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ" (Titus 2:11–13).

### Time and Eternity Meet

Some time ago, a preacher was asked, not maliciously, but in complete earnestness: "Is it not difficult to preach during these holidays? You always rehash the same thing for the young and the old on four advent Sundays, in various advent celebrations and in two Christmas services. Our world has become 2000 years older since the events of Bethlehem. We live in a completely different age today with new people, new values and different goals. The events at Bethlehem which you call a miracle are, for me anyway, like a dusty, worn out and old fashioned coat."

No! Christmas is something completely different than what people have made of it. The message of Bethlehem demonstrates a unique power. The door to God's world has opened. Surely, your salvation is coming. It is only for this reason that we have the courage to share the same message year after year. Each time we realize anew how difficult it is for us to grasp that Jesus Christ, the Son of God, became man, that is advent. This event, from the announcement of Jesus' birth from the lips of an angel to the babe in the manger, is so unique and wonderful that it can hardly be expressed in human words. Our Bible reference unfolds the meaning of Christmas with the words: "For the grace of God that brings salvation has appeared to all men."

Christmas wants to place this rousing message into our hearts: The living God has entered the his-

tory of the world and mankind through Jesus Christ. This is the only point where time and eternity meet. Here the lines intersect and form a cross.

The manger in Bethlehem begins that which is fulfilled on the cross at Golgotha: your and my salvation. Therefore what Philip told Nathaniel also applies to us today: "Come and see!"

What we are able to experience in that poor stable is surprising and joyful at the same time. God graciously lowers Himself to humanity and gives this sick world their Savior. Is that not unfathomable? God has unmistakably declared to all people: "For God so loved the world."

God acts in such an indescribably great way. His love does not consist of Him simply waving to us every now and then from heaven and providing us with a few holidays. He does not treat us like certain masters who every now and then have a gracious moment. God's grace is by no means exhausted by mere paternal benevolence. It is much more than philanthropy and kindness. God sacrifices the life of His only Son for our salvation. God's gracious condescension is so great that He lays our Savior in the manger and finally allows Him to die on the cross for us, so "that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life" (John 3:16b).

No one is excluded. This all applies not just to a select few or for a few especially pious people. The word is specifically "whoever"—so all people!

We classify people into groups—rich and poor, healthy and ill, good and evil, friendly and unfriendly, those who are long-established and newcomers, and we treat them as such. God loves us all equally. No one, no matter how burdened or repulsive, is excluded, not the man in a prison cell, nor the woman in a hospital bed. Even the person in the darkest of places is to know: God loves me.

Christmas says: I am like a lost penny, lying in the gutter of the street, who everyone walks past. But now God, in Jesus Christ, bends down, picks me up and polishes me until I shine.

Is that not the greatest Christmas gift imaginable? However, God wants to say even more: "This grace teaches us to deny ungodliness and worldly lusts."

We can celebrate Christmas in many different ways. We can create a mood: "During this holiday, everything is so celebratory and has such a great ambiance. It is so uplifting!" Or we say: "Christmas consists of so many profound thoughts!" In doing so, it remains a matter of the mind. Or—and this is likely the case with most people—Christmas is celebrated out of habit as a break from work. Afterwards, all the tinsel is packed away and put in storage until next year. What remains is an empty wallet, a hangover, and an empty heart!

#### We Have a Living Hope

This grace did not appear for our general edification and reassurance. The Son of God did not take upon Himself the poverty of the manger and the bitter agony of the cross so that we can be comfortable and idealistic.

God's grace will teach us a life of firm discipline and persistent hope. If this is not what you want, then Christmas will be completely misunderstood. God's goal is for you to bring your entire life in order.

Christmas is God's question to you: "Are you prepared to give way to the drawing power of My love and place your entire life in My hand?" You thereby lay all your days, whether they be light and radiant or dark and burdensome, in God's hand. It will hold and protect you every day.

"[L]ive soberly, righteously, and godly in the present age." What are these words in the midst of our busy lives? We hardly understand them. Whenever I hear them, I have to think of the young man who stumbled over these words when reciting them in religion class. Smiling, his classmate slyly whispered to him: "[L]ive like everyone else, brash and gregarious in this world." Is it not true that this is much closer to the nature of many: In order to stand your ground, you need to go through life living like everyone else, brashly and gregariously. Then your life will be in your control. Here however, in this Bible verse, God wants our life to be in His control. His saving grace will shape our lives even after Christmas as He—the Lord Jesus Christ—teaches us.

However, the power of God's saving grace extends infinitely further. Not only will my disordered past be cleansed, not only will my present be shaped by this grace to be sober, righteous and godly, but my future is no longer bleak. Whoever belongs to Christ has a living hope. Is that not truly good news for us who live in an age where hopes and expectations die as if they contracted a deadly disease. Think only of the disappointment and discouragement found in many marriages and families. They have grown apart and become strangers to each other, husband and wife, parents and children. Joy will not be found here, not even at Christmas.

Then the sounds of Bethlehem are heard: There is a hope that lives, that does not die, even at our own death. No iron rings can hold us captive. The walls of misery and death have crumbled. Now, no one needs to stay hopelessly imprisoned by guilt and distress, in a dark and aimless existence. Our life receives the wide horizon of eternity.

This is how we should celebrate Christmas! We are receiving a visitor, an exalted visitor who wants to bring us the greatest of all gifts. Jesus Christ brings God's saving grace. Let us take care not to get stuck in the outward celebrations, otherwise when Christmas is over, we are left with a glittering shell in our hands, but without anything inside it.

Today we want to consider a far higher and valuable offer from our God. Paul explains: "But when the fullness of the time had come, God sent forth His son" (Galatians 4:4). In Revelation 22:17, God's free offer is again repeated by John when he says: "And the Spirit and the bride say, 'Come!' . . . And

The Holy Spirit works in us to bring about this new life through salvation. From the back of the car, a quiet calm voice responded, "Don't worry, we've already crucified Him."



### Kazakhstan

"And the man asked him, saying, 'What are you seeking?' So he said, 'I am seeking my brothers."

Genesis 37:15-16

It is now 26 years that we have had a relationship with our fellow pastors and believers of the Church of God in Canada.

We are very grateful to God for this fellowship and would like to briefly describe how this association came about.

In the 1990's, Mikhail Gorbachev was President of the former USSR and introduced various reforms, which brought about many positive developments concerning the Christian faith. These policies had a beneficial impact on us in Kazakhstan. Thanks to these reforms, the door was opened to allow access for missionaries to visit, and many preachers and representatives of various faiths came into our country. We had more religious freedom and access to Christian literature, which now could be introduced without restrictions.

But even with all these positive developments, we felt we wanted something more. We wanted to have fellowship with believers from the Church of God family abroad. Through decades of separation we lacked the possibility to learn of these brothers and sisters. But how could we connect with them?

As I thought about it, I had an idea and decided to write a letter to the believers in Canada. The instrument God used was a Russian leaflet titled "Voice of Truth." Later we learned that the short stories and articles published in this leaflet had been compiled and translated

into Russian by Bro. Alfred Tuviks of Canada. Some of these publications were brought to our Bro. Adolf Ziert by believers from Germany and later came to us in Karaganda. On the back of the leaflet was the address of the publisher: "Voice of Truth," Publisher: Church of God, Canada. Address: 705 Concordia Avenue, Winnipeg, MB R2K 4J8 Canada. R. Roesler, Pastor.

We sent a letter to this address, which included the following: "Kazakhstan is currently being visited by various preachers from different denominations, but the brothers of the Church of God are silent. But we would gladly see and hear them." Br. Roesler told us later that he forwarded this letter to the brothers of the German-Canadian Mission.

After some time, a telegram from Br. H. D. Nimz came with an invitation to a telephone conversation. Br. Jakob Scharton, who was the elder of the church at that time, asked me to speak with Brother Nimz. Even today I remember how excited I was as I was traveling to the telephone location. I can not recall the complete conversation today, but Bro. Nimz mentioned that brothers from the mission gave him the mandate to get the necessary information for entry from the authorities. The manner in which the brother spoke gave me an inner respect and a positive outlook.

We were very pleased when we received this message. At that time, we were still living behind the "Iron Cur-



tain," as we used to say. To have a visitor from Canada was something extraordinary for us. But at that time it was not so simple for us in Karaganda to obtain permission. So we asked Bro. Artur Reimann from Zelinograd (now Astana) for help. Bro. Artur had a good relationship with the authorized representative for religious affairs in Astana. The latter agreed to help and initiated everything. So it came that the Lord directed the hearts of the authorities in Zelinograd and a visa was granted for Bros. H. D. Nimz and Heinrich Semenjuk to enter Kazakhstan.

The first camp meetings with the brothers from Canada remain firmly in our memory. In their messages, they chose specific scriptures or a theme from the Bible and built the sermon around it, making their messages clear and easy to understand. It also made it easier to remember what was said. The first message, by Bro. Nimz, was "I seek my brethren." That moved our hearts very much.

The Bros. H. D. Nimz and H. Semenjuk were the first to visit us in 1991. It has now been 26 years that two brothers visit us every year. Some of the brothers have made this journey several times; Bro. Nimz was on mission trips eight times. During this time, we were given cassettes with messages and songs, as well as other literature. In recent years, brothers from Germany have also come. As far as the opportunity allowed, we tried to

combine these visits with annual camp-meetings which take place in Astana.

Twenty six years of fellowship—this is a long period of time. During this time, there were various challenges that arose. We are very thankful to God, that in all these years, this warm relationship with the brothers has continued and been a blessing for the congregation in Kazahkstan.

We are also sincerely thankful for every brother that has visited us, especially for the sacrificial love, that they and their families demonstrated toward us. At this point, we would also like to express our gratitude for supporting the Russian "Gospel Trumpet."

We do not know how the conditions and possibilities in our country will evolve. Only the Lord knows this. But let us remain sincere and keep an intimate bond with our brothers and sisters in the faith. We pray that God would bless all believers in Canada. I leave you with the message in 1 Corinthians 15:58: "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."

Therefore, get up and "work out your own salvation" and the salvation of the world! Do not say the work is useless and in vain. We cannot always be certain where the sown seeds of truth will fall and take root. Sow them anyway. Testify of your Lord. Do not worry about the result; leave that to the Lord, but work with all your might. And truly, if the Lord's final victory is certain, then taking joy in the Lord's work is perfectly justified.

The Lord has hidden the day of His return from us. No mathematical equation can determine when it will come. The Bible tells us that the Lord's Day will come like a thief in the night. Therefore, be prepared and work faithfully for Him. Be a witness for Jesus through your faith, your walk, and your zeal, and rejoice that the Lord is coming again.

"Oh, that You would bless me indeed, and enlarge my territory, that your hand would be with me" (1 Chronicles 4:10).

### **Obituary**



**Pastor Erich Henschel** 

"For we know that if our earthly house, this tent, is destroyed, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens."

2 Corinthians 5:1

It has pleased our Heavenly Father to take His faithful servant Erich Henschel into His eternal heavenly home on August 22, 2016 at the age of 88.

Brother Henschel was born in West Prussia on June 11, 1928 to his parents Friedrich and Ottilie Henschel. He was the oldest of four surviving brothers and sisters. In 1944, while attending high school away from home, his mother died very suddenly due to complications resulting from an operation. In the same year, when he was only 15 years old, he was drafted into the army as a "Luftwaffenhelfer" (Air Force Assistant). In March 1945 his leg was injured by a bullet and the same day he was taken into Soviet captivity, where he endured four very difficult years.

Our gracious God protected Erich through all the dangers of war and captivity. This was certainly an answer to the earnest prayers of his parents, for their son had not prepared his heart for eternity. When he came home from the war, his father spoke to him about his soul and told him that he needed to get right with God. The Spirit of God convicted Erich and he repented of his sins and accepted Jesus as his Savior in repentance and faith. Thanks to the grace of God, through faith, he experienced forgiveness of sin, and his heart was filled with God's peace.

During special services in Oldenburg in 1951, brother Henschel met a young girl, Rita Hübner. He felt that she was the one that should become his wife, so in 1953 they were married in Wetaskiwin, AB, Canada, where they had both immigrated. God blessed their marriage with four children: Cornelia, Karin, Holger, and Peter.

In 1971 Bro. Henschel felt God nudging him to participate in the Bible School that was taking place in Edmonton. Following this calling, he gave up his job and went to Bible School for 3 years. Since then, he, together with his wife, devoted their time to full-time ministry. Their first pastorate was at the church of God in Wetaskiwin (from 1972), and after that they served for 16 years in the Church of God in Toronto, ON (from 1981). During their time in Toronto a new house of worship was built. Brother Henschel also went to foreign countries to preach the Word of God.

In 1997, Brother and Sister Henschel moved to Chilliwack, BC, in order to enjoy their retirement. During his retirement he was always ready to serve and help in the local congregation where needed.

In the year 2008, Bro. Henschel turned 80, and his health began to decline. In the next few years health concerns increased and his strength decreased more and more. But God gave his loving wife the health and strength to care for him at home right until the end. This made his suffering significantly more bearable. Even the doctors and nurses that came into the house noticed how peaceful and happy he was. Bro. Henschel





cherished his personal communion with God and always took time for prayer and Bible reading. He often spoke of the blessed time he had with God and how His presence had been so near to him.

The funeral for Bro. Henschel took place in the newly dedicated church building in Chilliwack, BC on September the 6, 2016. A number of pastors attended the funeral. The verse of scripture cited above was the service's theme. Bro. Henschel joyfully anticipated going to his eternal home. Now he can see what he believed here on earth. Our departed brother often prayed: "Lord, help us to always be ready to meet you." We want to live in such a way that we will see him in glory.

Bro. Henschel leaves behind his wife Rita, his children with their spouses, grandchildren and great-grandchildren, two sisters with their spouses, a brother-in-law and nieces and nephews. The congregation in Chilliwack and many brothers and sisters in various congregations share in the grief of the bereaved family. May the God of all comfort be near to all who mourn.
