preached the gospel to the people of Papua New Guinea without seeing the fruit of their sacrificial work of patience. The people heard God's Word, but they did not want to be saved. The brothers not only believed that God's Word and His Spirit were working on the hearts of the hearers, but now and then they also heard the natives openly admit it.

One of these men once said to a missionary: "You must wait a little longer and be patient with me. You are right: there is also a voice inside me that tells me that your Jesus talk is true, but I am still indecisive. I would still like to keep what I inherited from the fathers." Again, years passed. Everything remained the same. No one made a move to become a Christian.

Then a child was born to the missionary family, the Bergmann's. The natives took an intimate part in the joy of the parents. "Nothing

of all that the Papuans had come to know through the Europeans aroused such wonder as this white child," Bergmann recounts. One day, unknown visitors had arrived at the mission station, men from one of the mountain tribes. They were primitive men, who seemed to fully deserve the fearsome reputation they had among the tribes of the coast.

Bergmann used the opportunity to preach the Gospel to these otherwise unreachable people. They had heard it, but did not understand it. All of a sudden the missionary was inspired with an idea to make the gospel of God's love clear and understandable to these indifferent souls.

He went into his house and returned with his child in his arms. He placed the tender little white baby in the arms of one of the men. "Look at it," he said. "This is my only child. How sweet it looks! You wouldn't do anything to harm this child, would you?"

The man's arms, which held the child, trembled. Bergmann continued, "See, God has also placed His only Son, His holy child Jesus, in the arms of the world. And the world killed the Son of God. But what did God do then? He forgave the world this sin, and His love was so great that He gave them His Son as Savior and Redeemer. If you, dear man, were to kill my child, do you know what I would do? I would forgive you, pray for you, and still love you."

Then tears ran down the man's cheeks. He did not speak a word. With trembling arms, he handed the baby to the father and silently walked away into the wild forest. A few days later, he came to the mission station again, this time alone. "If this is true," he declared, "that there is such a God, and if He sends us such messengers, then I cannot resist any longer. I must become all new!"

ot too long ago, I had a conversation with a businessman. I asked him if he was swamped with a lot of work. He replied that he had his hands full, but that the worst was yet to come. At first, I didn't understand what he meant, but he quickly explained. He stated that the Christmas season generated the most stressful days of the year for him.

An observant person will notice that many people's actions and behaviors in today's world are no longer natural. It seems as though everyone is trying to increase their pace on a daily basis. It's a hustle and bustle from early morning until late at night. The start of a new year seems to be an opportunity to begin the great race towards a climax, where we convince ourselves we have accomplished something great. The Christmas season, in particular, is such a climax.

As we walk through cities today, we can observe an unusual flurry of activity among people around Christmas time. They are so entangled in the "Christmas frenzy" that they have completely overlooked the actual meaning of this special time. Few want to acknowledge what Christmas is truly about. For many, these are just days of interruption in their pursuit of something uncertain. They are so occupied with Christmas plans, wishes, and gifts that they just don't think what it's all about. Suddenly, on Christmas morning, it occurs to someone in the family that today is a day when at least one member of the family should attend a worship service. Why, and for what reason, few even know. Most people simply adhere to a custom or a tradition. Not many think about the profound significance of this particular day.

Is this Christmas? Is this a day to look forward to? Under such circumstances? Never! People who celebrate Christmas this way do not experience a true Christmas. They have merely used this day to outdo each other in exchanging gifts and "celebrating" with food and drink. When they look back at the end of

the "festive days," they regret and lament the wasted time and the fact that it all required so much effort. In the end, they are disappointed when they realize how much money they have spent. Oh yes, they may have even heard a sermon about a Jesus who was born over two thousand years ago. That's all that remains.

Was it the same in the times of our forefathers? "Oh," someone might say, "back then, it was already hectic enough." But truly we must acknowledge that in the past decades, humanity has become so carried away that they are no longer aware of how they are being driven. All these things point to the future of the Son of Man. "As it was in the days of Noah." We could add: "As it was in the times of the birth of Jesus, so it will be in the future of the Son of Man."

When Jesus was to be born in the stable in Bethlehem, the entire known world of that time was in turmoil and unrest. People were ordered to do something unprecedented. Every citizen was compelled to go to their ancestral city to register and participate in the census. The travel, the circumstances, the fatigue put people in a state where there was absolutely no room for Jesus. Every Jew had heard that the Messiah was to come. Most were aware that the time could not be far off. However, no one thought that it would happen at that time and under those circumstances.

Is it not the same in our lives today, in our rushing and busyness, that Jesus finds no place in the hearts of people? Is it not the case that even religious people are so influenced by worldly matters that they often no longer distinguish between what is normal and what is excessive, what is spiritual and what is worldly? What is Christmas without Christ? What is life without a living Savior? Many have heard that Jesus is supposed to come again someday. Few are aware that He will return. But the possibility that He could come at this very time is hardly on anyone's mind.

Satan has managed to maneuver people into a position where they do things they don't actually desire to do. Everyone you ask says they don't want to be so driven, but claim they are forced to be. Most often it's about the fact that they are under pressure to keep up with others.

Thankfully, there is a way to be free from this pressure and compulsion. It happens through the living Christ, who comes into our lives through salvation. Where this Savior resides, the joyful message of Christmas is not an unwanted interruption but a continuous inner experience. The angels announced to the shepherds in the field, "Peace on earth, and goodwill toward men." This peace is more profound and extensive than the "peace" created by a verse of "Silent Night, Holy Night" and the gentle covering of millions of snowflakes on the earth. This peace is not external peace. It's like a flowing river, continuous, constant, and infinite. It is tranquility, assurance, and security. It is well-being despite illness, joy despite sorrow, fullness despite insufficiency, richness despite poverty. This peace is life from God, eternal happiness.

For such people, Christmas is a highlight but not a peak of hustle and bustle. It's a highlight of their inner experience, because Christ was not only born in the stable in Bethlehem but still dwells as a living Savior in their hearts. To celebrate Christmas in this way is indescribable and glorious! External things are of secondary importance to them. For such people, Christ is a reality, a source of life, and a source of joy. Oh, what a richness of grace, what an inexhaustible source of joy!

If you are outwardly religious but inwardly sad, let this Christmas season lead you to the fact that Christ wants to be born in you. Let your discontented heart find the true, eternal, deep peace. Make room for Him today in your life, in your home, in your family. May great joy come to your home as you experience this, so that you can say: The Savior is born for me! Christmas will no longer mean restlessness, toil, and stress, but will truly be a God-given day of joy in your life.

"Rejoice always." (1 Thessalonians 5:16)

ejoice," that sounds wonderful. But "rejoice always?" If we take a look at our world and see all the difficulties and hardships, how can we still be joyful at all times? It seems that the apostle Paul never thought about these things or even experienced them himself. But in God's Word, we read about the apostle suffering persecutions, dangers, hardships, and disappointments in his life.

The word "rejoice always" was given to the apostle by the Holy Spirit. It was written to believers, and only they can understand it. They are the ones who have found the source of eternal joy. Christ, who was once sorrowful unto death, through the cross, made a way for believers to be free of anxiety and fear.

Jesus says in John 16:33, "These things I have spoken to you, that in Me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation: but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world." Here we have the comparison of "in Me" and "in the world." In the world you are afraid; in Me you are not. Here we see that the great privilege of being joyful at all times is for believers.

It is not only a privilege but also a commandment. Unfortunately, many believers do not obey it—but not because they are not true believers. Jesus told His disciples several times that their joy should be full. But joy is only perfected when it endures through difficulties, hardships, sorrows, and sicknesses. True believers know that all things work for the good to those who love God.

They can say, "If God *is* for us, who *can be* against us? . . . Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? *Shall* tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? . . . For I am persuaded that neither death, nor life, nor angels nor principalities nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor height nor depth, nor any other created thing, shall be able to separate us from the love of God which is in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:31-39).

Paul writes to the Philippians: "Rejoice in the Lord always" (Philippians 4:4). Here as well, we can apply the comparison "in the Lord" and "in the world." What is not possible in the world is possible in the Lord! The source of this joy is still available. Christ is the source of eternal joy. Nehemiah, the man of God in the Old Testament, knew this when he said: "The joy of the LORD is your strength" (Nehemiah 8:10).

Godly joy is so strong that it can boast even in tribulations. The believer sees the blessing that is hidden in tribulations. He considers it pure joy when he falls into many trials and knows that his faith, if it is righteous, works patience (see James 1:2-3). The believer who does not doubt the Father's love does not despair when he is disciplined by Him (Hebrews 12:5). Although discipline, when it is there, does not seem to be joy, it will later produce a peaceable fruit of righteousness. The many promises we are given confirm that the believer can always be joyful.

The three men in the fiery furnace praised and glorified God. Paul and Silas praised God while in prison. During the great persecutions of Christians, those who were led to the stake could not be stopped from praising the Lord.

When Jesus says to us, "Behold, I am with you always, *even* to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20), do we still have cause to be sad? Some say that Christians are hypocrites or low-spirited. This is certainly not true! Children of God are allowed to rejoice, and this joy makes them strong so they can master life to the praise of God and be a blessing for others.

"Rejoice always." This word applies to you who may be misunderstood by your family. It is for you who are grieving the loss of a loved one. If you are in pain, this is also for you. Yes, it is for all of us, young or old, rich or poor, educated or uneducated. Jesus, the Sun of Righteousness, wants to give us this joy!

to see what he sells; and persons very frequently look into our faces to ascertain what are the thoughts of our heart. Alas! that they should see any of us looking habitually sad. Some persons think that sour faces and somber garments are fitting emblems of sanctity. They would count it wicked to laugh, or if they were to do such a thing as smile in chapel, they would think that they had committed an unpardonable sin, though I never saw any law against that yet. All that is in us should bless His holy name, from the most playful fancy to the sublimest reverie. Ye need not emulate

those who, to appear righteous, disfigure their faces, that they may appear unto men to fast. Let me beg of you, Christian, when you fast, to be of a cheerful countenance, that you appear not unto men to fast. Be you never so sad, try and keep your sadness to yourself. Do not let people hear you murmur, lest they

should say, "Look at that Christian, he is weak as we are." You have heard the old fiction, that Jesus Christ never laughed or smiled. It was brought forward at a friend's, where I was once staying. There was a litle child in the room, who when she heard it, ran up to her father, and said, "Papa, that gentleman did not tell the truth." Of course every one looked at her, and waited for her explanation. "I know that Jesus did, papa," she added, "for the little children loved him; and I don't think they would have loved him if he had never smiled. Did not he say, 'Suffer little

children, and forbid them not, to come unto me' (KJV), and he took them up in his arms and gave them his blessing?" Do you think any good Christian could take up a little child without smiling; and if he did not smile, do you think the child would go to him? Jesus Christ did smile. A cheerful face wins honour to religion; a cheerful deportment glorifies God, for he has said, "Let the saints be joyful in glory: let them sing aloud upon their beds, [and] let the children of Zion be joyful in their King" (KJV). Be joyful, Christians! Be joyful!

Do Not Rejoice . . . Yet Rejoice!

"Then the seventy returned with joy, saying, 'Lord, even the demons are subject to us in Your name.' . . . 'Nevertheless do not rejoice in this, that the spirits are subject to you, but rather rejoice because your names are written in heaven.'" (Luke 10: 17-20)

hy did the Lord rebuke their rejoicing? Is it wrong to rejoice? Can we rejoice when we personally have victory over sin and all the power of Satan? May we not rejoice when the Lord equips us with the power to help others, that they too may be delivered from all the power of the enemy? Yes, we may rejoice. In Acts 8: 5-8, we read of Philip's work in a similar way to the seventy, that the unclean spirits came out of those possessed. Also, many paralyzed and lame people were healed, and there was great joy in the city. The same is written in Acts 15: 3, when Paul and Barnabas told of the conversion of the Gentiles in the churches. This brought joy to all the brethren.

Is not the gospel good news for both the messenger and those who accept it from the heart? Why did the Lord admonish the seventy that they should not rejoice that the spirits were subject to them? Did not the Lord Himself rejoice in the success of the seventy? Yes, He Himself rejoiced in that hour (Luke 10:21-22) because his life's work was beginning to bear visible fruit. He had received co-workers and His prayers began to be heard: first twelve, then seventy. Satan's power and dominion broke; he was driven out of hearts. Satan, although powerful, had to give way to the Almighty. Yes, this was reason to rejoice and thank God.

But why did He disagree with the joy of the seventy? It may be that the Lord, who sees all things and is the Searcher of hearts, saw something selfish in their joy. This, unfortunately, He observed at times in the 12 disciples. They said, "Lord, even the demons are subject to us in Your name." And Jesus' answer was,

"Nevertheless do not rejoice in this, that the spirits are subject to you." Next to the Lord and His name, they saw "themselves," their own person. Their joy would be pure if they gave glory to the Lord, but impure if they saw themselves in a selfish way. There was danger that this selfish joy would turn into pride. The Lord continually called the attention of His disciples to these selfish tendencies and by His own example and word showed them complete, pure love. He saw what was lacking in the hearts of His disciples and prayed for their sanctification, as we find in John 17:17. And He still prays for His followers today, that is, for you and for me. Also, the Lord gave His life so that all who are born again might be sanctified in the truth.

This truth makes us free not only from sinful deeds, but also from a corrupt, selfish inclination. Then, although greatly blessed, we can have a completely pure joy which gives glory to God. This is what the Lord meant when He said we should rejoice that our names are written in heaven. He wanted the seventy to turn their eyes from themselves and to the grace of God.

Now, dear Brother, dear Sister, I would like to ask you: If, like the seventy, you are doing well in the Lord's work, in preaching, in answers to prayer, in healings of the sick, in casting out demons, in the conversion of sinners, and as a choir director, singer, musician, Sunday School teacher, etc., is your joy pure? Or does something selfish get mixed in? When God blesses you materially, what is going on inside of you? In the essence of your joy, you can recognize yourself as you stand before your God. Give God all





the glory for your success! Earnestly seek the experience of sanctification!

Are sanctified people no longer tempted to give room to selfish motives? Yes, certainly they can be! We are still human and are dealing with our great self. The Lord was also tempted in this way. Before He began His spiritual work, the enemy wanted to defile Him with selfish desires and actions. He was to do miracles for selfish motives. But Jesus knew His enemy and the danger and resisted him. He waited for God's time and then did great miracles on God's behalf. However, He

did them from the purest motives, that is, in the love of God.

Paul, who was greatly blessed by God, was also prevented from falling into such false joy by being given "a thorn in the flesh" (see 2 Corinthians 12:7). This kept him sober. Let us also remain humbly prayerful so that no impure motives may be mixed with our joy, and so that we can always rejoice in our hearts, for the greatest thing is that our names are written in heaven.

Mary and Joseph– An Extraordinary Engagement Story

he Christmas story of Mary and Joseph is often romantically exaggerated today. But the reality of these young people had little room for romanticism. Although they played an important role in the life of Jesus during childhood and adolescence, the biblical account of them is quite brief. Yet it speaks of characters and choices that can be a blessing to us.

The Bible reveals to us a very special engagement story. Two young people of good origin with noble, God-fearing characters experienced God's guidance in a unique way. These previously unknown and insignificant people became part of God's salvation plan.

Mary

The story of Mary, the mother of our Savior, remains largely in the dark. Nothing is to distract from Him, the Son of God. No one but God Himself is to receive our adoration and divine worship. But the Word of God points us to a virgin in the small town of Nazareth in Galilee who was characterized by faith, humility, and love for God. She had a close and affectionate relationship with the old priestly family of Zacharias and Elizabeth.

Mary was still living in her parental home but was engaged to Joseph, a carpenter from Nazareth. He was a quiet, noble, and God-fearing man from the tribe of Judah. Their betrothal was the beginning of their marriage, by the standards of that time, and Mary was already his wife according to the law and society.

When the angel visited Mary (Luke 1:26), she was a pure, unblemished virgin (verse 27). She was startled by the angel's unusual greeting, "Rejoice, highly favored *one*, the Lord *is* with you." Her reaction is understandable in context of the historical background. Women had so little prestige at that time that Jewish men usually refrained from greeting them. Moreover, the angel told her that she had found special favor with God.

But the message that followed left her stunned. "You will conceive in your womb and bring forth a

Son." At that moment, she would certainly not have grasped the enormous implications of this news, because she stood shocked and completely perplexed before the angel. No one knew better than herself that she had remained pure and had never been with any man. How was she supposed to become pregnant?

Two special characteristics of Mary appear here: her faith and her willingness to sacrifice. She believed the word of God through the angel, even though it logically made no sense to her. She was certain that God's way is always a holy way.

Then she consecrated herself and her whole life to God's will, for a pregnancy at that time made her appear dishonorable before her fiancé and the world, deserving death by stoning. Moreover, she could not assume that God Himself would explain these events to Joseph. She let herself fall completely into the hand of God: "Behold the maidservant of the Lord! Let it be to me according to your word."

All this can be treated and read lightly from today's point of view. But at that time, Mary did not yet have this realization about the way of salvation, about the miracle that the Son of God was to become man. On the other hand, the position of a mother with an illegitimate child was completely different from what we experience today in our godless, liberal society. She was threatened with ostracism and a humiliating death. The only protection for her was the word of God through the angel. God worked in her the deep conviction of the truthfulness and reliability of His plan.

Joseph

The carpenter Joseph from Nazareth, a young man from the tribe of Judah, had been chosen by God to be Jesus' father before the world. He was suited to Mary and was to provide the newborn with protection from gossip and ensure legitimacy in Jewish society.

Suddenly, Joseph realized with great dismay that the noble, God-fearing, and exemplary Mary was pregnant. What anguish of soul this realization must have



caused the law-abiding, upright Israelite. How sorely he had been deceived! Did this God-fearing young woman, through whom he had often been blessed and encouraged, not even exist? Had she faked it all? With each day, his distress grew, the pain deep.

As a law-abiding Jew, he now could not bring Mary home as his wife. According to the custom of the time, he himself would have committed adultery if she had become his wife. His only option was to hand her over to the public court to face the full penalty of the law. Or he could separate with her amicably by giving her a letter of divorce, and then she could have married the child's father without much fuss.

In their greatest need, God Himself came to the aid of the young couple. The angel's word restored Mary's full honor and at the same time instructed Joseph how to act wisely and rightly (Matthew 1:18-25).

Have you sometimes wondered, "How can I tell if a word really comes from God or if it originated from my own thoughts?" But from Joseph's experience, we can learn that God works in us a deep, unshakable conviction of His divine will. We know what He wants to convey to us. At the same time, we are also convinced of the unshakable truth of this message. This is precisely the experience Joseph had that night.

However, it was not only through the message that certainty was established. God Himself had already given a reliable testimony through the prophets in the Holy Scriptures. The angel was able to point Joseph to the scriptures in which this event had already been prophesied. Joseph believed this message. Thus, for Mary, the word of God became at once promise, legitimization, and protection.

The next morning, Joseph did everything necessary to follow God's instruction. Surely the young people would have talked to each other about these encounters with the heavenly messengers. They would have told each other of their fears, worries, and courageous decisions of faith. So began what was for them a new, unfamiliar journey together.

The example of Joseph and Mary shows that God knows us. He knows about our thoughts, desires, worries, and fears. But He has a way of blessing for us. He has the power to guide our lives wonderfully and make them a blessing for us and those around us.

It is good to trust completely in the Lord, even if we do not know the reasons and the outcome. The all-knowing God has the power to lead everything gloriously and to glorify Himself in our lives as well. Even if the way sometimes feels like a dead end, the future dark, even like a heavy burden—the way of the Lord is always the best. Believing God and trusting Him completely is the safest and most rewarding thing we can do.

Children Always Need Their Parents

hildren need their parents. They need them when they are 1 year old and when they are 4, and 9, and 15. But it does not stop there. At age 20, and 30, and 45, children need their parents too. When this need is most urgent, the children themselves are often not aware of it. "Prodigal" children need loving and praying parents.

Show your lost children that you love them. Love them like our Father loves His children, even the ones who do not serve Him. Just as He lets the sun rise for both the righteous and unrighteous, do not let your love be affected by whether your child serves God or not. Pray for your children, regardless of whether they serve God. Never give one of your children cause to feel that you value them less than any of their siblings.

Unfortunately, when we are hurt and angry, we can react in ways that surprise even ourselves. If we allow our pain to dominate our thoughts and emotions, we can end up destroying relationships or even people. When dealing with lost children, we open ourselves up to a deep and cutting pain. If we are not careful, this can lead to reactions on our part that are extremely damaging and may be very difficult to repair. We have much reason to pray for ourselves as well: a hurtful word can cross our lips so quickly, and an unwise action can be so easy to undertake. Children are a big responsibility, but it is one that God saw fit for us to take on. This responsibility also helps us, as parents, to grow, refining our character as we learn to better understand the thoughts and the working of our heavenly Father.

Luke 15: 4–6. "What man of you, having a hundred sheep, if he loses one of them, does not leave the nine-

ty-nine in the wilderness, and go after the one which is lost until he finds it? And when he has found *it*, he lays *it* on his shoulders, rejoicing. And when he comes home, he calls together *his* friends and neighbors, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep which was lost!'"

When I think of the prodigal son, my mind immediately goes to the shepherd who had lost one of his 100 sheep. Just as he went after that single lost sheep until he found it, God went after the prodigal son, even if His pursuit was not visible to the naked eye. He worked in the background, leading, permitting, and speaking, all with the goal of saving the prodigal son. The father's intense prayer at home played a big role as well. If one of our children leaves us, turns away from God, and heads off into the world, this affects our heavenly Father's heart even more than it affects ours, as the parents. God does not want anyone to be lost, and that includes our children. He has enough love for all lost children! Let Him go after those who are lost. He knows how to proceed and how far to push. He will do His best. He will do everything possible to save your child! You can be sure of that. Your job is to support this spiritual work with sincere, earnest, trusting, and persistent prayer. Proverbs 15:29 says, "The Lord is far from the wicked, but He hears the prayer of the righteous." God hears your prayers and will give you the strength you need during this time. He will comfort you. Put all your trust in Him, and do not doubt His love for your child.

God suffers alongside us. He will answer our prayers, even if years may pass before the results be-

come apparent. We sometimes read of mothers and fathers who die, still thinking their children lost—but then see them again in eternity after all! Our prayers can be answered after our death; many daughters and sons have found the Lord only at their parents' graveside or even later. What seems hopeless to human eyes is not hopeless from God's perspective. In fact, there remains hope as long as the person you are praying for is alive. Ecclesiastes 9:4 says, "But for him who is joined to all the living there is hope."

There is great joy in heaven when a sinner repents. The Shepherd rejoices when He finds a lost sheep and brings it back home. If your son or daughter, your sister or brother, comes home, share your heavenly Father's joy! Accept them just as they are. Open your arms and extend a loving and forgiving heart.

Even if your prodigal child has already returned, do not forget all the other lost children of your brothers and sisters in faith. Whether their children have left the faith or never been part of it at all, so many mothers and fathers are waiting to welcome them home. Offer these parents empathy and compassion. Share their burden in prayer. Let their concerns become yours. Encourage them to trust in God and His leading. Trusting in God can take a lot of effort. We live in a world full of hurt and broken words, but God is trustworthy. We can be certain that our trust is in good hands and that He will use our vulnerability for our benefit rather than against us. If we pray from this place of trust, we can be confident that He will do everything in His power to save our children.

We are grateful that You know our thoughts and feelings. We ourselves were once rebellious children who rejected Your guidance, chose bad paths, and caused You much sorrow. We were prodigal children, but in Your great love, You came after us to save us. You did not give up until we saw ourselves through Your eyes and had to recognize that we were wretched, miserable, poor, blind, and naked. We did not know how to stand before You, but You came running towards us to embrace us against Your loving, fatherly heart. You forgave us everything and never held it against us. You showed such grace and mercy towards us.

Now You see our wounded, bleeding hearts. Our children, too, have turned away from us and from You. Please keep our hearts from becoming angry, bitter, and self-pitying. Help us forgive those who have hurt us, and help us accept them the way they are. Give us Your vision, compassion, love, and comfort.

We also pray for our loved ones, who are rebelling against You and against us. Protect them from the evil in the world. Keep them from great harm. Let them feel that we are praying for them. Protect their hearts from hurting themselves or others and let them know that You are near and hear their cries.

When the time comes, we ask You to bring them back. Grant us the wisdom to understand your timing. Strengthen our trust and faith. And when it is finally time, help us run towards them, accept them without reservations, and hold them in our arms.

As we ask these things, we trust in Your grace, knowing that You are a good and merciful God. And we know we can ask all this because You have already demonstrated Your great love by sending Your own Son, Jesus Christ. In His name, we pray to You. Amen.

nce again, we have journeyed through another year—and we are still on this earth. Time is passing rapidly. It has taken us with it. It has left its mark on us and in our being. What will we answer when He says, "Look, for three years I have come seeking fruit on this fig tree and find none. Cut it down; why does it use up the ground?" (Luke 13:7). Isn't the Lord right?
